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Number STMA's Johnson, state's top prospect, signs with one: reigning NCAA champs

Tessa Johnson is one of the **I** handful of in-state players whom the Gophers would have loved to sign. However, when South Carolina came to the Target Center for the Final Four last March, Johnson watched the Gamecocks beat Louisville 72-59 in the semifinals and was transfixed.

"My dad and I looked at each other during the game and thought I would fit in well with them," the St. Michael-Albertville star told the Star-Tribune. "They were fast and aggressive." South Carolina went on to defeat UConn for the championship, further impressing the sharpshooting 5-foot-10 guard. A subsequent visit to their Columbia, S.C., campus nailed down her decision. She signed in October. state title at STMA before moving on to

Being recruited by the national champions and their legendary coach Dawn Staley is heady

stuff, but Johnson was sought by "pretty much every top program in the country, except UConn," said her coach Kent Hamre.

In the HoopGurz Recuiting Rankings on ESPN, Johnson is the top-ranked senior in the state and No. 25 nationally. She had it narrowed down to South Carolina, Minnesota and Baylor, she said.

Johnson entered her senior season with 1,545 points despite missing her sophomore year with a leg injury. The Knights were state runners-up last year, losing in the finals to Hopkins.

Johnson has a singular goal for her senior year. "I am looking to win state, that's it," she declared to MBBN. "We have something to prove this year and that is exactly what we are going to do." To achieve that, they'll probably have to get past Hopkins, their conference rivals, against whom Johnson is 0-4 in her career. Hopkins and STMA (4-0) are currently ranked 1-2.

Johnson heads a strong STMA top seven that also includes seniors Piper Carlson (Idaho State recruit) and Mackenzie Berg, juniors Ava Haus and Ja'Kahla Craft, sophomore Abby Hoselton and freshman Cail Jahnke. There's also a deep bench,

Hamre said, with Kylie Diaz, Maggie Lindeman and Gabby Voigt all capable. They've had three different high scorers.

About being regarded as the state's top recruit, Johnson said, "I don't worry about rankings, but it does show me that all the work I put in is worth it. At the same

time, it tells me that I need to keep working since I am going to the reigning national champs and I am top in my class."

Johnson broke in as an eighth-grader averaging 10.4 points on a section runner-up team. She scored 18.6 ppg as a freshman, helping the Knights reach the state semifinals, where they lost to Farmington. She missed her entire sophomore year with a broken femur in her left leg which, she said, doctors attributed to ongoing stress more than one incident.

She came back with a huge junior year, averaging 21.5 points, 5.7 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 2.8 steals per game, leading the Knights to the state finals, where they lost to heavy favorite Hopkins 72-56.

In five state games, she has averaged 21.8 points. Last year, she had 67 points and shot 11-for-27 on three's at state.

Regarding the year she missed, Johnson made the most of it by closely studying the action in games and on film.

"While I was on the bench, I was able to see the little details on the court, especially on screens," she told MBBN this week. "It isn't just on ball screens, but every screen. Being out for so long made me feel like I could predict what was going to happen within a possession. I think I am able to read the floor, my teammates, and my coaches better now."

Still not fully recovered — "My hip strength is not fully back," she said recently — Johnson is averaging 20.5 points after four games for the Knights, who were to face another unbeaten team, Chaska, tonight (Friday).

"Tessa has the full package," Hamre assessed. "She is an extremely good outside shooter, gets to the rim either side, and can take a player into the post. She has a very high basketball IQ. She makes everyone around her better. You can also find Tessa and her brother in the gym every morning at 5:30 a.m. Her success didn't happen without a lot of time in the gym." Johnson built up her strength with weight room work, starting in her sophomore year when sidelined with the leg injury, Hamre said.

Asked to pick out any particularly outstanding games by Johnson, the coach was hard-pressed. "There are so many," Hamre said. He cited a couple from her freshman year. "I would say the first one was at Hopkins her freshman year when she was going toe to toe with Paige Beuckers. They had a great battle trading great play after great play. (And) she hit a three at the buzzer to beat Eden Prairie."

What especially stands out, though, Hamre said, is "how she always happy for her teammates' success."

Johnson, whose summer team is AAU power North Tartan, will be the fifth Knight to move on to Division I. Her sister Rae played for Iowa State from 2017-21. Sydney Tracy played for South Dakota State, Erin Autio for South Alabama and Jenna Stangler for Valparaiso.

Rae Johnson scored 1,730 points for the Knights and was a Miss Basketball finalist. Another sister, Claudia, played basketball when she was younger but not in high school; her ambition is law school, Tessa said. The three sisters have a younger brother, Jeremiah, a sophomore who plays basketball and football for the Knights. "Jeremiah and I work out every morning, either lifting or shooting," said Tessa.

Johnson played volleyball the last three seasons and had 162 kills on a 20-6 team this fall. "Obviously, volleyball wasn't my main sport, but it helped my jumping and moving abilities," she said. "I could feel a difference when I played basketball."

Johnson's next coach will be Dawn Staley, 52, who has collected four Olympic gold medals (three as a player, one as head coach), was named to the WNBA's first All-Decade team, and has taken South Carolina to four Final Fours in the last seven years, with championships in 2017 and 2022. "I will trust my future with Dawn," Johnson said.

Staley assessed her first Minnesota recruit as follows: "Tessa is a well rounded player who uses her perimeter ability and size to play multiple positions. She is a proven perimeter scorer at three levels. We anxiously await her skill set that allows her to not only complement but elevate her future Gamecock teammates' play."

Breakdown's annual Tip-Off Classic on Saturday offered its usual array of intriguing matchups that caused adjustments in the weekly state rankings.

There's a new No. 1 in Class 1A after Cherry toppled Hayfield 62-43, led by Isaac Asuma with 18 points, 10 rebounds and eight assists. Noah Asuma added 16 points, Carson Brown 14, and Isaiah Asuma 12. Hayfield, two-time defending state champion, beat Cherry twice last year, including the semifinals, and once in the summer. "It was nice to finally get them," said Jordan Christianson, Cherry coach. "We have tremendous respect for their program, players and coaches." Cherry lost its opener to a strong Deer River team 50-48. Isaac

Asuma missed that game with a thumb injury from football.

Another No. 1 losing was Class 3A's Totino-Grace, nipped by Class 4A's No. 2 Lakeville North 68-65. Nolan Winter netted 18 points, Hudson

Drake 12 and Jack Robison 11 for the winners. Totino-Grace keeps its top rank, though.

DeLaSalle shaded Minnetonka 69-67 with Nasir Whitlock pouring in 35 points, capped by a game-winning fadeaway jumper at the horn. Minnetonka tied the score on two free shots by Andy Stefonowicz with 18 seconds left. For Minnetonka, Ibrahim El-Amin sank 20 points, Jaden Cain 14 and Stefonowicz 12.

Lake City held off Minneapolis North 82-81 after leading by 21 at halftime and by eight with a minute left. North, with Zashon Rice hitting 34 points and Max Wilson 26, took an 81-80 lead with 10 seconds left. Jaden Shones sank two game-winning free shots with 2.7 seconds on the clock and led the Tigers with 22 points. Hunter Lorenson had 20, Heise 16 and Keegan

Dreier 1,013, McDonald 1,012

NLS girls coach passes boys record-holder in career wins

Mike Dreier officially became the state's overall leader in high school basketball coaching victories when New London-Spicer edged Delano 52-50 at home Friday.

Already almost 300 wins ahead in wins among girls coaches, Dreier notched his 1,013th, all of them for NLS, which surpassed the boys record of 1,012 held by the late Bob

McDonald, who coached for 52 years, mostly at Chisholm, including three state champion teams.

In contrast to such occasions as his 900th and 1,000th, the occasion was kept low-key, as per the wishes of the man himself. "To tell the truth, I don't even pay

much attention to it," Dreier said Monday. As he's done on previous milestones, Dreier praised the multitudes of dedicated players, their supportive families, his longtime assistant and volunteer coaches, and the school administration. The milestone was acknowledged only with an announcement after the game.

On behalf of the school, activities director Thayne Johnson stated: "What makes it even more remarkable is that he has been able to do

it all here at New London-Spicer. Oftentimes, when coaches have the amount of experience that Mike does, it comes at two or more schools." A commemorative basketball will be presented to Dreier later, Johnson said.

After the Delano win, which came in his 1,200th game, his record is 1013-187, an .844 percentage, with 18 state tournaments, two state titles and five runner-up finishes. He ranks fifth nationally in wins among girls coaches. McDonald is 18th among boys coaches.

Tonia (Nelson) Finstrom, one of two Dreier alums to play for the Gophers (along with Lindsay Lieser), was

among the ex-Wildcats in attendance. "It was an honor to play with some great players (at NLS), and to play for a coach who really cared about us. Those are some of my best memories," said Finstrom, a 1993 graduate. "He certainly was a major influence in my life."

Bob McDonald, who died in 2020, is such a prep legend that the boys coaches' association's annual award for best senior player is called the McDonald Award.

"Those two guys are both great ambassadors to the game of basketball," said Paul McDonald, Bob's son, who played on two state champ teams in the 1970's and coached Vermillion CC for 29 years. "I know my dad would be very happy for Mike." Three sons and a daughter followed Bob into coaching. Dreier went up against Sue (McDonald) Tesdahl of Crosby-Ironton in the 1991 section finals, winning 49-46. "We knew it would be a tough game. Dreier always adjusts so well," recalled Tesdahl. "I heard he was getting close to dad's record, but we have no hard feelings about that. Not many people stay in coaching as long as him and dad."

Among girls coaches, the next two in total wins are the late Myron Glass of Rochester Lourdes with 719 and Ron Gunderson (retired) of New Prague with 684. Glass had an incredible 8-0 record in state finals. Two of those came against Dreier's teams, although NLS subsequently beat Eagles in a state semifinal game.

Avery Rich, in her fifth year on varsity, has participated in 99 of Dreier's wins and counting. Rich and Jaden Coahran led the win against Delano with 19 points each. Also involved in around 100 wins were Tonia Nelson, Tracy Hanson, Jackie Reese, Sue Olson, Lindsay Lieser, Sara Spears, Susan Semmler, Steph Dobbs, and all-time scoring leader Taylor Thunstedt.

The Minnesota state champions and the runners-up will be invited to play in the 8-team Pacesetter Great Five-State Championships at the Target Center in Minneapolis against top teams from Iowa, Wisconsin, North Dakota and South Dakota.
