Benilde-SM is dual threat

And get used to it as both Knight teams are young

Benilde-St. Margaret's has a chance to duplicate what Totino-Grace did last year, sweep the boys and girls Class 3A basketball titles in March. And for both Knight teams, the window of opportunity extends beyond this year.

Early in the final month of the regular season, the Knight girls are ranked No. 1 with a 14-4 record, led by a junior and sophomore, all four losses against Class 4A powers. The Knight boys, getting most of their scoring from sophomores, are ranked No. 2 with a 13-3 record, behind Totino-Grace.

The Knight girls are averaging 77 points — most in Class 3A — and have beaten No. 6 Holy Angels 88-73 and No. 9 DeLaSalle 80-67, along with Class 2A's No. 5 Minnehaha Academy 90-77.

Knight junior Olivia Olson, already committed to Michigan, is averaging 21.9 points, 9.6 rebounds and 4.2 steals. She recently became BSM's career scoring leader for boys and girls and passed 1,500 points. Sophomore Kendall McGee is averaging 21.7 points, 5.2 re-

bounds and 2.8 steals. Sierra Lumpkin, a senior, adds 9.4 ppg and Zahara Bishop, a sophomore, 8.7 ppg.

Girls coach Tim Ellefson, asked what he likes about what he's seen so far, said, "Relentless attack. We attack you defensively, making you play fast, and usually that is in our favor. We then attack the basket quickly with multiple players that can get to the rim."

The Knights have lost to Class 4A's No.1 Hopkins 77-65, No. 2 Chaska 92-83, No. 7 Eden Prairie 83-77 and No. 11 Minnetonka 56-52.

"Close losses to these teams have

helped us work on our weaknesses," Ellefson said. He added, "I like that we have accepted that we have lots to learn and improve on. We are not settling on winning, but rather of playing the right way."

The Knight boys stumbled last week with a 75-72 loss at Waconia (5-10) but they've beaten Class 3A's No. 3 DeLaSalle 55-49, No. 5 Alexandria 82-78, No. 6 Mankato East 70-63 and No. 7 Orono 78-59. They've lost to Class 4A's No. 5 Wayzata 73-62 and one of Wisconsin's top teams, Middleton, 51-47.

The Knight scoring leader is 6-foot-7 sophomore guard Jalen Wilson with

17.9 points per game, followed closely by sophomore Jaleel Donley with 13.1 ppg, junior Jayden Daisy with 12.8 ppg and sophomore Abu Keith with 12.3 ppg. Keita nabs 10 rebounds per game.

Boys coach Damian Johnson assessed: "We have been shooting the ball extremely well this year. Five of our

top eight players are above 36 percent from three. We are also long and athletic, with the potential to be dominant defensively."

He added, "I like the way we have been fighting through adversity. We have played a tough schedule and have found ways to win."

The win over DLS is the highlight so far. "It has been a lopsided rivalry," Johnson said, "and getting a win this year was big for us to overcome a mental hurdle within our program."

The BSM girls placed sixth at state last season. The program has six state trips and with state titles in 2006 and 2010. The Knight boys have made three state trips with a championship in 2008 and runner-up finish in 2007.

Roberts, Shudlick among MN Hall of Fame picks

inda Roberts and Carol Ann Shudlick, prep basket-∠ball legends of the 1970's and 1980's, respectively, who had prodigious college careers with the Gophers, are among 10 new additions to the Star-Tribune's Minnesota Sports Hall of Fame. Roberts, known mainly as a monster rebounder, led St. Paul Central to the first state girls championship in 1976. She still holds the Gopher career rebound of 1,413 and her 1,865 points ranks sixth. Her senior year, 1980-81, the Gophers, not yet playing in the Big Ten or the NCAA, had a 28-7 record, most wins in program history, and reached the NAIA final eight Shudlick, the 1990 Miss Basketball winner with Apple Valley, went on to capture the 1994 Wade Trophy as the nation's top college player with the Gophers. She scored 1,558 points in high school and averaged 20, 22 and 23 for the Gophers (1990-94) her last three years, setting a record of 2,097 that stood until Lindsay Whalen broke it. The Hall of Fame class will be introduced March 1 at the Mall of America. Other honorees are Lou Nanne, Mychal Thompson, Scott Studwell, Mick Tinglehoff, Paul Krause, Katie Smith, Jean Freeman, and Bob Johnson.

Whitlock's record 52 leads big Islander win

Nasir Whitlock of DeLaSalle poured in a school record 52 points against one of the top metro teams, Hopkins, on Jan. 28, leading a 91-78 win by the Islanders. Whitlock, a 6-foot-2 senior point guard who's averaging 27.9 points, shot 15-for-22 from the field (5-for-8 on three's) and 17-for-21 on free shots. He has committed to Lehigh, a D-1 program in Pennsylvania. As a junior, he averaged 22.9 points to lead a state

runner-up team. The Islanders are currently 14-4 and ranked No. 3. Whitlock broke the team record held by one of the Islanders all-time greats, 6-foot-8 Reid Travis, a 2014 graduate who had 51 against Breck during a state championship season his senior year. Reid went on to stellar college career with Stanford (three years) and Kentucky (one year).

Fifty-plus point games by seven players have been reported to MBBN this season. As previously noted, senior Braeden O'Neill of Norwood Young America scored 61 in a 90-82 win over Monticello on Dec. 9, and senior Tessa Johnson of St. Michael-Albertville scored 51 in a 97-70 win over Chaska on Dec.16. The others are sophomore Gabrielle Fineday of Cass Lake-Bena with 58 in a 107-13 win over Laporte on Jan. 24, sophomore Brooks Johnson of Duluth Marshall with 56 in a 92-77 loss to North Woods on Jan. 27, Mountain Iron-Buhl senior Asher Zubitz with 51 in a 98-62 win over North Woods on Jan. 13, senior Isaac Matti of Hayfield with 50 in a 76-50 win over Blooming Prairie on Jan. 24, and Whitlock (above).

A very Koenen, Montevideo's all-time scoring leader, reached the 2,000 point marker while scoring 25 in a 48-35 win over Minewaska Area on Jan. 31. That milestone came eleven days after Koenen snagged her 1,000th rebound during a win over Morris Area/Chokio-Alberta, 66-40, on Jan.10. There are 76 girls with 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in state hoops history, according to state record keeper Matt

Pederson. Koenen, 6-foot-3, also a volleyball and track star, has signed with North Dakota State. She led Montevideo to its first state tournament last season. The Thunderhawks are 13-2.

Providence Acad. topples Hopkins

Greenway sinks 41 as Lions win 87-80, snap Royals streak at 42

Providence Academy won duel of top-ranked, defending state champion teams over Hopkins, 87-80, riding freshman guard Maddyn Greenway's 41-point siege, last Saturday, snapping the Royals' 42-game win streak against Minnesota teams.

Greenway also generated seven steals, eight assists and six rebounds, and the Lions had three other double-digit scorers, as they overcame Stanford recruit NuNa Agara's 37-point performance for Hopkins in the marquee game of the Breakdown Community Clash at St. Michael-Albertville. Grace Counts added 12 points, Brooke Hohnecker 11, and Hope Counts 10 points and 10 rebounds for the Lions (15-2).

"This is obviously a huge win for our program. Honestly, just getting the chance to play this game at all has been great," Providence Academy coach Connor Goetz said. "We have a lot of larger schools turn us down for one reason or another, so I give Hopkins a lot of credit. They say they will play anyone, anywhere and they mean it."

Hopkins had not lost to a Minnesota rival since Chaska upset them in the 2021 state semifinals.

The Royals (17-1), who also had Liv McGill with 14 points, led 38-29 at the outset. The Lions caught up 43-43 at the half. Hopkins led by six or seven again in the second half. Late in the game, three-pointers by Hohnecker and Emma Millerbernd erased a six-point Hopkins lead. The Lions edged ahead and got another Hohenecker trifecta to open an 81-75 lead with a minute left. Grace Counts sank two free shots with :28 left for an 85-80 lead, and one last breakaway basket by the mercurial Greenway finished the job.

Hopkins played without second-leading scorer Taylor Woodson, a Michigan signee, who's injured. The Royals, always with college prospects at every position, had won 57-50 over No. 3 Wayzata (14-3) and 86-60 over No. 11 Minnetonka (12-6) without Woodson ear-

lier in this grueling week.

Greenway shot 16-for-16 on free shots. Goetz assessed: "She is so good with her first step at getting by anybody, and then when she gets in there she's really starting to get crafty about how to finish, how to

draw contact, how to get to the line ... She shoots close to 200 free throws a day."

The Lions coach also cited Hohnecker for face-guarding Kelly Boyle — "We think she's a big reason that Hopkins wins a lot of games" — and Millerbernd for the "the tough task" of trying to slow down Liv McGill.

Providence Academy has played in two straight state title games and still has a very young roster with a good chance for a long Class 2A dynasty. While a number of schools don't want to play a loaded private school team, the Lions have been able to line up some formidable competition this season, Hopkins being foremost on that list.

The Lions lost to Iowa's top-ranked large school, Bishop Garrigan Catholic, 93-89, and to Class 3A's No. 2 Becker 83-76, early in the season. They won a rematch over Becker (13-3) 76-65, and have beaten Goodhue (15-2) 74-68, Mountain Iron-Buhl (14-3) 87-53, St. Croix Lutheran (13-3) 77-52, Minnehaha Academy (11-4) 71-60, Mahtomedi (10-5) 74-54, and Mayer Lutheran (13-3) 84-45.

This was the first time Providence Academy has dueled Hopkins since losing to the Royals in 2009-10 and 2012-13 when Ray Finley coached them.

Flom has a career record of 390-156 and was national coach of the year in 2020. During the suspension, Eden Prairie's best player left the team to take an early graduation to enroll in a college, where he will play football, and Flom's son, a guard, also left the team but has now returned. The Eagles have lost to Wayzata and Edina since his return. North St. Paul players voted to not play Eden Prairie.

Girls coaches Hall of Fame adds four

Four 2023 inductees have been named to the Minnesota Girl Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame. They are Byron Negen of Virginia, Mountain Iron-Buhl, and Rock Ridge; John Noga of Parkers Prairie; Ellen Thompson of St. Thomas, Macalester, Hopkins and Holy Family; and Dan Woods of Holy Angels.
