Lakeville North is led by another Wisconsin recruit, 6-foot-11 Nolan Winter

Nolan Winter, the son of two Minnesota Gopher athletes, is the latest Lakeville North basketball star to cast his lot with the Wisconsin Badgers.

Before moving on to the Big Ten, the 6-foot-11 Winter has a more pressing matter to address, trying to help the Panthers reach a state tournament, after his first two seasons ended in the section semifinals.

Winter, who missed four games recently with a recurring ankle injury, is averaging 22.7 points and 11.2 rebounds, shooting 52 percent overall and 30 percent on three's. He averaged 17.5 points as a sophomore on a 17-9 team and 11 points as a sophomore on a 13-7 team.

The Panthers — actually led by two future Badgers, as junior Jack Robison has verbally committed as well — are 16-2, ranked No. 2 in Class 4A, and share the South Suburban lead with No. 3 Eastview, each 9-1.

They won all four games Winter missed. He got back on the court against No. 10 Shakopee on Jan. 27 and hit 30 points in a 79-71 win. This past Tuesday, he drilled 32 points in an 81-60 win over No. 11 Lakeville South.

The Lakeville North lineup also features Hudson Vaith, a 6-foot-5 senior guard averaging 15.9 points, and Robison, a 6-foot-6 wing averaging 15.8 points. Anthony Quam, a 6-foot-4 junior forward,

“Very skilled basketball player for a kid his size,” assessed John Oxton, Panther coach. “Great shooter. Good touch around the basket. Great rebounder and shot blocker. Not super athletic, but great perimeter skills for 6-11. Great hands and ball skills.”

Oxton adds that Winter is a high character guy: “Great kid. Very smart player. Team oriented. Does everything we ask him to do. Always willing to volunteer and represent our program in a variety of ways.”

stepped up and averaged 15 points in Winter's absence.

Winter's father, Trevor, from Slayton, a small town in southwest Minnesota, was a 7-foot backup center for the Gophers from 1993-97. His mother, Heidi (Olhausen) Winter, from Lakeville, was a 5-foot-11 hitter for the Gophers from 1992-95. Trevor and Heidi's other offspring, Macy, was captain of Lakeville North's 2017 state champion team and attends the Naval Academy.

Winter, also pursued by the Gophers, Stanford, Xavier, Oregon State, St. Thomas and Nebraska, didn't get any recruiting pitches at home. He told the Star-Tribune, "My dad and mom both went to Minnesota, but they've been telling me ever since Day One (that) this is your decision."

He came to the same decision as past Lakeville North bigs Nate Reuvers, a 6-foot-11, four-year starter with the Badgers (2017-21), and Tyler Wahl, a 6-foot-9 senior currently averaging 12 points, and committed to UW and coach Greg Gard in September.

"It's really a college town and they really care about their sport, which is cool," Winter told a Madison TV station after touring the UW campus. "You can tell that everyone takes Badger sports seriously."

Robison will rejoin Winter at Wisconsin, having verbally committed a month after Winter.

"They love the people, the campus, player development, and winning," Oxtan reflected, about his school's pipeline to Madison. "They have seen others from LN go before them and have a great experience. So I guess they think they can do the same."

NLS is lone girls unbeaten after surprising blowout

New London-Spicer is now the only unbeaten girls team in Minnesota, after an unlikely blowout of their recent nemesis Montevideo, 64-29, at home on Thursday, Feb. 2. Montevideo has the entire lineup back from the team that, last season, ended 25 years of losing to NLS by thumping the Wildcats 68-54 and 41-26 and advancing to their first state tournament. NLS led by just four early in the second half but decimated the Thunderhawks the rest of the way by forcing a torrent of turnovers and burning up the nets. "We played pretty well, and things just caved in for them (Montevideo). It was crazy. We had a great second half," said NLS coach Mike Dreier. Dakota Rich supplied 18 points (five 3-pointers) and eight assists, Delaney Hanson 14 points (four 3-pointers), and Avery Rich 13 points and six steals for the Wildcats, who are 21-0 and ranked second in Class 2A behind defending champion Providence Academy. Avery Koenen, the 6-foot-3 North Dakota State recruit who led both wins last year, had 17 points for Montevideo (17-3), which will likely get another shot at NLS in Section 3AA.

Almost full-court shot at horn lifts Chisago

Patrick Rowe made probably the longest game-winning shot you'll ever see, giving Chisago Lakes a 90-89 win over over Becker on Tuesday evening. The 6-foot-6 junior, who had 43 points in the game, let fly from halfway up the free throw lane and hit a bulls-eye on the other end as time ran out.

"I'm sure a little bit of adrenaline helped me," he told MBBN. "I don't think that I could ever duplicate that shot."

With 1.5 seconds left, Becker missed a free throw. Chisago Lakes guard Dan Wille snagged the rebound and dished off to Rowe, who, with his left shoulder facing down court, made the herculean throw with just his right arm, and some guidance from his left hand.

"As soon as I threw it, I thought it had a chance to go in. It was straight on," said Rowe. "If anything, I thought it might be too long."

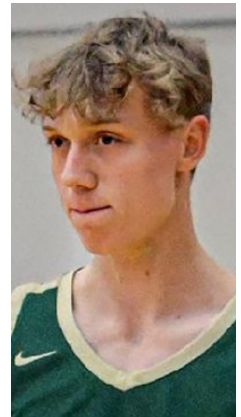
Asked what's the longest basket he's made previously, either in a game or goofing around, he said, "Probably just outside the center line."

That was actually his second buzzer-beating, game-saver shot of the evening, as he also sank a three-point with time running out in regulation to knot the game 79-79. "Dan got the ball to me that time, too," he said.

Rowe, a basketball-only athlete who's averaging 25 points, said it was especially gratifying to pull out a close game because the Wildcats (7-13) have had several single-digit losses.

"That shot ranks at the top of anything I've done in my career so far," acknowledged Rowe, who averaged 14.9 points as a sophomore.

Jack Walker added 15 points and Zander Schmidt 12 for Chisago Lakes. Becker (8-10) had five double-digit scorers, led by Kyle Bloomquist with 29.

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SP Johnson climbs back after 0-5 start

St. Paul Johnson lost its first five games but the Governors have won 11 of their last 12 and moved into the Class 3A rankings at No. 16. "We were playing a lot of kids that were new to the program, as well as three ninth-graders and an eighth-grader," said coach Colin Moore about the rocky start, adding that their lead guard missed the first five games. One of the freshmen is Kenny Turner, who sparked two big wins last week, scoring 21 points in a 61-60 win over Minnehaha Academy (13-6), including the game-winner on a reverse layup, and 22 in a 73-58 win over Highland Park (11-6), who beat them 59-57 earlier in the season. Turner is averaging 14 points and eight rebounds. "He's learning to control the paint on both ends," said Moore. Dewayne Givens averages 15 points, eight rebounds, 4.5 assists and three steals, and guards the opponents' top player "A jack of all trades," Moore said. K'jon Jordan is a slashing, high energy guard averaging 11.5 points, six rebounds, three assists and three steals. "We defend well, forcing turnovers, and play well in transition. We like to run," said Moore.

Mayer Luth. trips BLHS

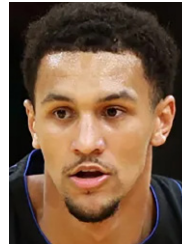
Mayer Lutheran (17-3) handed Buffalo Lake-Hector-Stewart (19-1) its first loss, 67-58, led by Madeline Guetzkow, who scored 28 points and went over 1,000, on Monday in Mayer. That was a crucial game with regard to section playoffs as both play in the north sub of Section 2A along with BOLD (16-4). "We have one of the toughest sub-sections with them and BOLD," coach Kris Gustin told the local paper, the Herald Journal. "This was a big one as we'll get the No. 1 seed and avoid the second-round matchup, but we're anticipating playing them again, and they're going to come out gunning for us." Mayer Lutheran also beat BLHS twice last year on the way to third place at state.

Daughters of both coaches scored their 1,000th point when Rochester Century edged Lakeville South 61-57 last Saturday in Rochester. Taylor Clarey, Century junior, daughter of coach Chadd Clarey, had 23 points. Finley Ohnstad, Lakeville South junior, daughter of coach Angie Ohnstad, had 16 points. Ohnstad joins her parents in the thousand-point club. Angie Iverson scored 1,366 for Owatonna, and Mitch Ohnstad scored 2,048 for Fairbault. Both played for the Gophers.

Minnehaha honors Suggs in trip home

Jalen Suggs, Orlando Magic guard, came home in Minnesota to face the Timberwolves recently and his alma mater Minnehaha Academy took the opportunity to honor the hero of three consecutive state championship teams, the Star-Tribune reported. During the Redhawks 85-75 win over Blake on Thursday, Feb. 2, the school officially retired his No. 1 jerseys in basketball and football. (Suggs was also a coveted D-I recruit as a quarterback.) Suggs spoke briefly, thanking the fans, his parents Molly Manley and Larry Suggs, teammates, and representatives of the Magic who were present. "Lot of great memories in this gym, a lot of great games, practices," he said. In the crowd was Chet Holmgren. Suggs and Holmgren were both Mr. Basketball and went No. 5 and No. 2, respectively, in their NBA drafts, after one season each with Gonzaga. Holmgren is sitting out what would have been his rookie season with Oklahoma City due to a summer foot injury. Suggs helped the Magic beat the Timberwolves 127-120 the next night, contributing 10 points, three steals and three assists off the bench.

Injury ends Osseo star's career

Alayah Wilson's prolific career at Osseo has ended prematurely due to a knee injury suffered Jan. 27 in a game against Park Center. Coach Doug Erlien reports that her MCL, PCL and ACL were damaged. The 5-foot-8 guard was averaging 21 points when injured. She tallied 27 ppg as a junior, 18 as a sophomore and 10 as a freshman, totaled 1,602 career points and had a team record 47-point game last season. Wilson committed after her junior season to Lindenwood University, a Division I team in Missouri. At Osseo, she was a standout on struggling teams throughout her career. The Orioles were 6-9 when she was injured this year, and 17-56 the previous three years.

BLHS twins reach 1,000 together

Kristi and Rachel Kottke, junior twins at Buffalo Lake-Hector-Stewart, scored their 1,000th point in the same game, a 79-40 win over Atwater-Cosmos-Grove City on Jan. 23. Matt Pederson, state basketball record-keeper, said he's not aware of any other instance in state history of siblings reaching 1,000 together.

Looking ahead to the shot clock next year

Next year, a shot clock will be used in all varsity basketball games for the first time, as per a new MSHSL rule, but some conferences went ahead and adopted the 35-second shot clock already this year.

Fargo Forum writer Todd Rose checked in with Moorhead and Dilworth-Glyndon-Felton coaches to ask how that's going.

Moorhead's Matt Ellingson told the Forum that he's "excited about it ... I think it's great for Minnesota hoops," and noted that every other level of basketball (college, NBA, international) has it.

DGF's Mike Clark said the shot clock "will allow for more exciting and faster-paced play." He added, "However, we've found out that 35 seconds is longer than it sounds and still allows us to be patient and get the shots we are looking for. There will be a learning curve for everyone."

Coaches will be studying what coaches have done in other states, like North Dakota, that already have it, Ellington speculated.

"Defensively," he said, "it's nice to be able to tell your kids that they can see exactly how long they have to guard for. Currently ... it could be a minute or it could be two minutes."

Clark said many teams are already playing a faster game than in years past so "it will affect some teams and programs more than others."
