Roseau's Borowicz sisters: down to one last season by Kacie after Kiley and Katie exit with painful illnesses

Borowicz — that's the name that transformed Roseau from a Canadian border town best known for hockey prowess to one that also produced one of the most prolific basketball families in state history.

With Kiley, Kacie and Katie Borowicz gracing the green-and-white, each spaced two years apart, Roseau made five consecutive state tournaments with one state championship, one runner-up finish and two third-places.

The trio netted numerous all-state honors, one Miss Basketball award, two finalists, and 9,186 combined points — and that was with the youngest skipping her last year to join the Minnesota Gophers early.

The Borowicz era is now down to one final season for Kacie at UND -- with two of the sisters' stars forced to flame out early.

Kacie, the Summit League's leading scorer for North Dakota, is taking the option for a fifth year. Her sisters both had to quit after two college seasons.

Kiley was forced out before her junior season at Minnesota State-Moorhead

due to a life-long struggle with arthritis. Katie, this March, stepped away from the Gophers with two years left, also due to a congenital ailment, in her case a brain/spinal problem that affected her legs.

"Both my sisters' stories were heartbreaking and sad," Kacie told MBBN. "I had many conversations with both of them before they made their final decisions, and it was hard to see them taken from their sport, knowing how much time they put into it."

Kacie missed one season herself, with a stress fracture in her right leg during her second year at UND, and wore a boot for two months, but she was much more fortunate than her sisters, returning to put in 19 and 21 points per game the next two seasons.

"It never bothered me in high school. I haven't had any issues with it since," she said.

The girls' most memorable season was 2016-17 when Roseau went 32-0, capped by a 75-64 win over Sauk Centre in the finals, when Kiley was a senior, Kacie a sophomore and Katie an eighth-grader. They didn't have a close game all season.

In the final seconds, Kiley hooked one arm around each sister and pulled them close with tears streaming down her face. "I was just thinking about how we're done playing together," Kiley told reporters after the game. "Our journey ever since third grade is over."

Kiley had 20 points, Kacie 19 and Katie nine that night.

Katie was the point guard, averaging seven assists per game. Kilev was a Miss Basketball finalist and averaged 26 points.

With two Killer B's still playing, the Rams reached the title game again in 2018, after Kacie scored 40 against Maranatha Academy in the semifinals. Sauk Centre beat them in a finals rematch 63-52. In 2019, the Rams were stopped in the semifinals by Caledonia and finished third.

Kacie, who played in all five state tournaments, all-tourney every time, was named Miss Basketball in 2019. She scored 3,501 points, including 319 in 15 state tournament games. She broke the school career record, which was no small feat as another Minnesota hoops legend, Megan Taylor, racked up a then state record 3,300 points, graduating in 1997, before going on to stardom at Iowa State.

Kiley scored 3,225 points at Roseau, including 268 in nine state tournament games, and Katie, after forfeiting her senior season, finished with 2,460 points.

Katie led the state with 32.3 points per game on a 20-6 team as a junior, breaking the family record as Kacie's top average was 28 and Kiley's was 26, both of them, of course, having superstar sibs to share the ball with.

The Borowicz family total is still growing with their two

younger brothers playing. Eighth-grader Jordan pumped in 23 points per game on the varsity this winter, including a school record 48-point game. Jake, a sophomore, who is a different kind of athlete, 5-10 and 270 pounds, is a football lineman and a thrower in track while also playing basketball.

Their parents, David and Tracy, were star athletes at Stephen, about an hour away from Roseau. David played football at UND, where he was Division III All-American, mainly at linebacker, and Tracy played basketball at Moorhead. One daughter each would follow them to their respective alma maters. The couple settled in Roseau because David, a mechanical engineer, always wanted to work for Polaris, headquartered there.


> Kylie, the oldest, was about eight months old when an arthritic condition showed up. She was an early, enthusiastic crawler and walker, David said, but suddenly stopped doing so and seemed to be experiencing pain in her wrists and ankles. Alarmed, they eventually took her to Children's Hospital in Minneapolis. "They said she was the youngest person they had seen to be diagnosed with arthritis," said David, adding that this affliction ran in his family. Kiley had the poly articulate kind

that moved around to different joints. She had to be medicated from an early age. Her condition went into remission enough for her to thrive in high school basketball and volleyball. At Moorhead, though, arthritis pain came back and would not let go.

Borowicz averaged 13.9 points and 5.3 rebounds on a 27-7 team at Moorhead her sophomore year, and was an all-Northern Sun Intercollegiate first-team pick. She had

a 37-point game against Augustana, setting a team record as she had to pull out in September of 2019.

with nine 3-pointers. But there would be no junior season "It was very hard, for how much work I put into it," Borowicz told the Fargo Forum, at the time, about her decision, adding, "I just couldn't do it any more, and I finally realized I had to look out for my future body ... I did not want to make it worse."

Kiley has a physical education degree and did some substitute teaching in the St. Cloud area but found that she liked working as a bartender and waitress better, and made a lot more money that way, too. She moved to St. Paul in May.

Katie's lifelong affliction is Chiari Malformation, in which the cerebellum part of the brain, at the back of the skull, bulges through the opening in the skull where it joins the spinal cord. This results in pressure on parts of the brain and spine and makes it difficult for spinal fluid to pass through.

She joined the Gophers at age 17 when then-coach Lindsay Whalen, needing guards right away, invited her to graduate early and skip her senior season at Roseau to play college ball a year early. Katie was thrilled to accept the offer and looked forward to playing four years in the Big Ten.

She played in 14 games as a freshman averaging 3.9 points, then had surgery after her first year to open up that passageway and missed the entire 2021-22 season. The operation helped, but not enough.

The 5-foot-6 point guard returned this past winter, was named a captain, and played for an extra year due to the shortened Covid-19 season. in 29 games, 17 of them starts, averaging 8.5 points. She Kacie said it was a "no-brainer" for her to capitalize, eshad five steals in five of the games and shot 90.5% from pecially since she felt she had been shorted one season the free throw line.

The pain would not subside. She tried cold packs, ice baths, and pills, but, she lamented, "When I play, it only gets worse, and I've come to associate basketball with trying to find a job." pain."

Katie announced shortly after the season, in a tweet, that she was done: "My decision to medically retire is the most difficult and painful one I've ever had to make. I've

been struggling for the past year to push through and put a smile on my face, but my body is telling me enough." Kacie averaged 7.7 points on a 15-15 team as a freshman at UND. Her second season was limited to nine games, averaging 8.8 points, due to a stress fracture in her tibia, which she thought was shin splints before it was diagnosed. UND labored to a 2-19 season.

Fully recovered after resting and rehab, she became the prolific scorer she was expected to be, averaging 19.4 points in 2021-22 and the Fighting Hawks got back to .500 at 15-15.


This past season, Borowicz averaged 21 points and 4.8 assists, both tops in the Summit League. One highlight was a 20-for-20 free throw performance against Montana State, a league record, on the way to a .957 season at the line, secondbest in the country. She had 33 both that game and against Western Illinois. UND had its first winning season during her tenure, 19-13. She has scored 1,466 points for the Fighting Hawks.

Borowicz is a senior this year but college athletes are eligible

because she was hurt that year anyway.

"I really just want to play as long as I can," she said. "I'd rather be in college making memories than working or

After UND, Borowicz said, she plans to eventually work as a graphic designer, for a business or a sports team, although the possibility of pro basketball overseas has "always been something for me to think about."
