Sweet 16 boys field has 2022 winner

Park Center, three state champs

An impressive field for the 34th annual Pacesetter Sweet 16 boys tournament includes defending champion Park Center, three of the four reigning state champions, and 13 teams ranked in the final Top Ten. It will take place Aug. 5-6, at College of St. Benedict's. Four of the top teams in each of the four classes are chosen for this one-class tournament. At this posting, the pairings have not been determined. Senior-dominated Russell-Tyler-Ruthon is the only one of the four state champions not in the field, but four of the top eight teams in the Class A ranking will be here. Following is the Sweet 16 lineup.

CLASS 4A

WAYZATA – The Trojans, who beat Park Center in overtime for the state championship, were ranked No. 3 heading into playoffs and finished 27-4. With five of the top six graduated, the team's outstanding veteran is Jackson McAndrew, 6-foot-8 guard who averaged 16.7 points and made the all-tourney team.

PARK CENTER – The Pirates, who were top-ranked and lost to Wayzata in overtime in the state finals, after winning the 2022 title, finished 28-3. Returning starters are guards Casimir Chavis (16.0 ppg) and Jackson Fowlkes (13.0 ppg), both all-tournament picks, and center Chiang Ring (10.5 ppg).

HOPKINS – The Royals, ranked No. 8, finished 19-9, powered by a young tandem of sophomore-to-be point guard Jayden Moore and junior-to-be wing Anthony Smith, both averaging just under 21 points.

MINNETONKA – The No. 4 ranked Skippers were section runners-up to Wayzata and finished 23-8. Top returning players are guards Anthony Stefonowicz (16.4 ppg) and Jordan Cain (15.8 ppg).

CLASS 3A

TOTINO-GRACE – State champs for the second straight year, the Eagles were 24-8 against a big-school schedule. Three all-tourney players graduated. Isaiah Johnson-Arigo, 6-foot-7 forward (12.4 ppg) is having an outstanding summer and attracting double-digit Division I offers. Another starter back is guard Zy'Lerre Stewart (5.9 ppg).

ALEXANDRIA – The Cardinals return three starters from a 25-6 team that was ranked No. 7 and placed fourth in the state tournament – Grayson Grove, highly-recruited 6-foot-9 center; Chase Thompson 6-foot-7 forward; and soph guard Bralyn Steffensmeyer.

DELANO – Three double-digit scorers return from the No. 12 ranked Tigers, who finished 20-8: Will Strande-

mo (19.6 ppg), Max Iverson (17.6 ppg) and Jake Schultz (13.0).

MANKATO EAST – The No. 10 ranked Cougars, who finished 24-7 with two close losses at state, return forward Carson Schweim (17 ppg), guard Brogan Madison (15 ppg) and forward Gandon Fish (10 ppg). However, Schweim, a MN-Mankato recruit, will miss the Sweet 16 with a shoulder injury.

CLASS 2A

ALBANY – The Huskies, ranked No. 7, captured their first state crown and finished 32-1. Three starters graduated. Two who made the all-tourney team as sophomores return: guard Ezekial Austin (41 points in the tourney) and forward Sam Hondl (48 points).

LAKE CITY – Four starters return from the No. 2 ranked Tigers, who finished 26-2 with a close section finals loss. Back to lead another state bid will be Jaden Shones, Hunter Lorenson, Keegan Ryan and Jack Meinke, all guards.

MN VALLEY LUTHERAN – The 25-4, section runner-up returns three starters: guards Benjamin Pearson and Kyler Flunker and forward Aaron Black.

WASECA – Six of the top seven scorers are back from the No. 16 Bluejays (21-7) – guards Damarius Russell (top scorer), Carson Ohnstad, Zach Hulscher and Deron Russell, and forwards Laird Keeton and Noah Thompson.

CLASS 1A

SPRING GROVE – The Lions, who were ranked No. 7 but placed third at state and finished 31-2, bring back two all-state tourney picks in guard Elijah Solum and forward Jaxon Strinmoen (each had 35 points at state) along with another starter, guard Jacob Olerud.

CHERRY – Gophers recruit Isaac Asuma, senior-to-be guard (21 ppg and 2,719 in his career) heads a list of five of the top seven back from a No. 2 ranked, 25-3 team that took fourth at state. Isaac and Noah Asuma, sophomore-to-be, made all-tourney. Also back are Noah Sundquist (19 ppg), Carson Brown, and Isaiah Asuma.

CASS LAKE-BENA – The Panthers, ranked No. 2, finished 25-3 with a 58-57 upset loss to Fertile-Beltrami in the section. CLB returns high-scoring guards Kaydin Lee and Dominic Staples-Fairbanks and forward Kingsley Whitebird.

DAWSON-BOYD – The No. 8 ranked Blackjacks were 26-4 and section runner-up to state champion RTR, handing the Knights their lone loss while losing two close games to them. Returning standouts are guard Brayson Boise (20 ppg) and Drew Hjelmeland (14.9 ppg), both juniors-to-be.

Eden Prairie is defending champ in more wide-open Sweet 16 girls field

For once, Hopkins will not be the defending champion at the girls Pacesetter Sweet 16, which is slated for Aug. 5-6, at the College of St. Benedict in St. Joseph. The Royals' string of eight consecutive titles ended last year with a finals loss to conference rival Eden Prairie. Both are back for the 2023 tourney. Providence Academy, Class 2A champion with most of its firepower back, has a good chance to become a rare non-Class 4A champion. The Lions are only one of the four 2023 state champions in the field. Three state runners-up will be there: Hopkins (4A), Stewartville (3A) and Albany (2A). The Sweet 16 assembles four of the leading teams in each of the four classes for a one-class bash over two days. Not all the invited teams are able to attend, but it's always a powerful field. Following are 14 teams in the field; the last two spots were not secured at press time.

CLASS 4A

EDEN PRAIRIE – The top three scorers graduated from the Eagles' No. 5 ranked, 22-10 team that placed third at state. Returning starters are Tori Schlegel (13.4 ppg) and Rae Ehrnan, both juniors-to-be at guard.

MINNETONKA – One of the top juniors in the state, guard Aaliyah Crump, who averaged 22 points, leads the Skippers, who were ranked sixth and finished 17-11 last year. Their other returning starter is soph guard Lanelle Wright (10.5).

HOPKINS – Five-star prospect Liv McGill, committed to Florida, leads the Royals. The 5-foot-8 guard (14 ppg) is the lone starter back from last year's No. 2 ranked team that lost to STMA 71-70 in the state finals and finished 28-3. However, Hopkins always has plenty of talent waiting their turn.

LAKEVILLE NORTH – The Panthers bring back the top three scorers from a No. 12 ranked, 23-9 season capped by a fourth-place state finish. They are forward Trinity Wilson (13.8 ppg) and guards Gabby Betton (11.4 ppg) and Gracie Winge (9.3).

CLASS 3A

GRAND RAPIDS – The Thunderhawks, ranked No. 2, finished 26-4 after going 0-2 at state with their 2,000-point scorer injured. Returning starters are post Jessica Lofstrom (16 ppg) and forward Braya LaPlant (9.2).

TOTINO-GRACE – The Eagles, 2022 state champs,

slipped to 8-21 last year but were section runner-up and return a talented young backcourt trio of Chloe Nuss (15 ppg), Maria Radabaugh (10.5 ppg) and Itiro Stuka (9.5 ppg).

HILL-MURRAY – The Pioneers, who finished 17-13 after going 0-2 at state, look to come back strong, led by guards Elise Groppoli and Hailey Wolgamot, and one of the state's top-ranked freshmen, Mya Wilson, who transferred from Mahtomedi (13.5 ppg).

STEWARTVILLE – The Tigers are loaded with young talent back from a 29-3, state runner-up season. Ranked No. 4, they lost to Benilde-St. Margaret's 66-60 in the finals. Returning are four of their top six: senior Savannah Hedin (43 points in the state tourney) and sophomores Ella Theobald (37 points), Audrey Shindelar (24 points), and Jayci Rath.

CLASS 2A

PROVIDENCE ACADEMY – The Lions went 30-2, including a win over Hopkins, and lived up to their No. 1 ranking with their second straight state title. Maddyn Greenway, soph guard, led the state with 31.8 ppg. A Miss Basketball finalist graduated, but five of the top six are back. Others are senior Brooke Hohenacker (11 ppg), junior Hope Counts (9 ppg), freshman Ella Millerbernd (6.5) and highly-touted eighth-grader Ari Flies-Peterson (5.8 ppg).

ALBANY – Last year's No. 2 ranked state runners-up are loaded with the top six back from a 30-2 team – 6-foot-3 Alyssa Sand (49 points at state), Tatum Findley (35 points), Kylan Gerads (35 points), Savannah Petzer, Eva Schwenzfeier and Callie Holthaus.

CLASS 1A

WALKER-HACKENSACK-AKELEY – Five of the top six scorers return from a 21-8 team, led by junior guards Aubrey Morrison (21 ppg) and Avery Morrison (11.6 ppg).

CASS LAKE-BENA – The Panthers had a young squad that finished 17-12 last year, led by junior-to-be Gabrielle Finneday, who had games of 58 and 47 points.

HANCOCK – The Owls, after winning the 2022 state title, were 23-5, ranked 11th, and section runner-up last year. They return 53 points per game from three starters: Kaitlyn Rohloff (24.5), Misti Zempel (15.4), and Kaitlyn Staples (12.8).

KELLIHER-NORTHOME – A young squad looking for its first state trip, the Mustangs were 25-3 and ranked 13th last season. Returning starters are sophomores Kate Thayer (24 ppg), Kylee Binkley (15 ppg), and Allison Lundin (8.9 ppg) and senior Ella Thayer (10.8 ppg).
