Super shooter leads MIB UNC recruit Jordan Zubich eyes repeat title

Basketball has been Jordan Zubich's passion all her life, but this year is especially sweet for the Mountain Iron-Buhl sharpshooter and her teammates. That's because MIB finally broke though with a state Class 1A championship last March on their school's 12th state trip in 13 years.

"It was really cool," she said, "to celebrate with the community behind us and go to parades in the summer and feel all the respect that we earned from everyone in Northern Minnesota."

On the summer circuit, she enjoyed the Rangers new notoriety: "Hearing other teams talking about us, like, 'We're playing the state champs next!' We got lots of that this summer, and it was definitely a confidence boost."

another state title to pursue.

With all but one starter back, the Rangers are 4-1 (losing to Class 4A Roseville) and ranked first. As great as it feels to be reigning champs, Zubich said they need to stay humble. "We know that does not give us a free ticket to do it again this year." She likes their odds, though. MIB's 65-43 win over Buffalo Lake-Hector-Stewart at the Breakdown Tip-Off Classic, she said, "showed we are still one of the top teams in single-A."

Zubich holds the state record for three-pointers in a season, 137, during her sophomore year, and will likely break the career record soon. She started this season with 403 trifectas. The record is 458, held for 11 years by 2012 Miss Basketball Marissa Janning of Watertown-Mayer. Interestingly, Zubich

Zubich, a 5-foot-11 guard, had a lot to do with the state title as she averaged 26.5 points, 5.2 rebounds, 4.5 assists and 3.0 steals for the Rangers. She entered her senior year with 2,578 points, 159 of those in eight state tournament games.

One of the state's premier players, she has signed with North Carolina. Before heading to Chapel Hill, there's might break the school and state record the same game; Chelsea Mason had 455 for MIB, graduating in 2017.

Zubich shot 49 percent on three's as a sophomore and slipped to 42 percent (still outstanding) as a junior with opponents working hard to deny her good looks. She shot 73 percent on field goals and 85 on free shots as a sophomore, and 64 and 80 last year, while her steals, assists, and rebounds went up.

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Asked how far out she is comfortable, she said, "the volleyball line," meaning the out of bounds stripe for volleyball that's just a couple strides inside the basket-ball mid-court line.

North Carolina coach Courtney Banghart has Zubich slotted as a shooting guard who can hit long three's and stretch the defense to loosen things up for inside players, according to a report on the fan site Inside Carolina.

Signing with UNC (over the Gophers and other suitors) was especially delightful for Zubich because her father has been a devoted Tar Heel fan all his life and the fam-

ily followed suit. In fact, her full name is Jordan Carolina Zubich.

"It's so exciting because we grew up watching them compete for national championships. You can't really beat Carolina blue," said Zubich, who first attracted the UNC coaches' attention while attending a camp in Chapel Hill after her sophomore year.

Dan Zubich, who starred at Babbitt-Embarass High School, scoring 1,196 points, got Jordan started at an early age. His first assignment for her was guarding her brother Asher, a year older.

senior and that's his college sport. He saw brief action as a freshman QB at St. Olaf this fall.

Jordan and Asher had a couple serious three-point contests along the way that were close but she won both times. "But he could always counter and say that he will beat me in a one-and-one game anytime," Jordan said. Mainly, she added, the sibs just enjoyed their time together as gym rats.

Her father has been her primary shooting coach since taking her to the gym regularly from early childhood, "He taught me to step shoot, instead of a jump stop

> shot like most girls in our area do," she said. "That has made all of the difference in my ability to get my shot off quick." She also credits Dyami Starks of Starks Academy for helping her expand her range, and playing with Minnesota Fury, her club team that's known for long-range shooting.

> There are two more Zubich's, by the way -- her brother Tebow, 13, who plays football and basketball, and her sister Zoey, 11, who plays basketball and volleyball. Jordan said their mom, Becky, didn't play basketball.

Jordan and Asher were in the unique position of having the

"I was given the green light to foul, scratch, and do anything in my power to not allow him to score," Jordan said. "That was fun for me, until it was Asher's turn to guard me. He was not given the green light to foul; he was just told to play his best defense. I truly believe that made all of the difference in giving me the confidence I have on the court today. I figured if I could score on the best boys player from our school, I could score on any of the girls on our team."

The last four seasons, both the MIB boys and girls teams had a high-scoring Zubich. Asher holds MIB records with 3,576 career points and a 60-point game. He averaged 31 points as a freshman and 26, 27 and 25 points the last three years.

The Ranger boys were not quite as successful as the girls, going 21-8 and losing in the section semifinals his last two years. However, Asher quarterbacked the football team to the state nine-man championship as a

same coach, Jeff Buffetta. While guiding girls teams to state year after year, Buffetta added the boys coach position when Luke Winans retired in 2019. Jordan said it was an interesting experience, especially on days Buffetta combined the practices and she got to play against Asher. "Mr, Buffetta does have a lot of passion for this sport, so that helps with his motivation to show up every day."

Zubich was in cross country, track and volleyball for a while, and started for the VB team in eighth grade, "But none of those are nearly as fun as basketball," she said, so it's been basketball-only throughout high school.

Asked who's her favorite player, she said, "I really like to watch Caitlin Clark. I mean, who doesn't?" The Iowa superstar has what Zubich aspires to. "I would like to have her ability to see the floor and play an all around game the way she does. That is something that I really want to work on in my last year here at MIB."

Rainey Welson poured in 41 points for Hortonville, sinking seven 3-pointers. Last season, Hortonville reached the final four in the largest of Wisconsin's five classes and beat Minnetonka at the Breakdown. The Polar Bears are 2-2, also losing to the top-ranked team in their division in Wisconsin. For Providence, Brooke Hohenecker added 15 points on five 3-pointers, eighth-grader Ari Peterson chipped in 12 points and seven rebounds, and Hope Counts 13 points and 12 rebounds.

The Rosemount Irish went overtime to defeat Wayzata 89-85 with Avery Moeller sinking 25 points, Ava Thompson 18, Ashna Ramlall 18, Ava Thompson 18, and Amisha Ramlall 12. For Wayzata, Kate Amelotte pumped in 29 points. Allie Burns added 16 points, So-

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AHA legend returns as coach

Troy Bell, Academy of Holy Angels superstar in the 1990's, and a collegiate All-American after that, has returned to the Richfield private school as the boys head coach. "We are thrilled to welcome Troy back on

campus where his legendary basketball career began," activities director Carolyn Arnebeck stated in June. Bell, in the same press release, said, "Holy Angels holds a special place in my heart." The 1999 graduate led the state with 35.9 ppg as a senior totaled 2.491 career points. At Boston College, Bell was Big East Player of the Year and AP All-America second team his junior and senior years. He had a brief NBA stint, then an overseas pro career in Spain, Italy, Germany, Turkey and Argentina. He

• The Hayfield boys had a great three-year run: Class 1A crowns in 2021 and 2022 and a 23-7 record last year. Now the Vikings are starting over. "We lost over 4,000 career points," coach Chris Pack explained. That's due not only to graduations but also the transfer of rugged post Zander Jacobson to Minnesota Valley Lutheran.

• Dave Cresap, Perham boys coach for 28 years, retired this year with a 666-298 record, five state tournament teams and one championship (in 2011), not to mention the pandemic-shortened 28-0 season in 2019-20. He also retired from the classroom, but is continuing his coaching career, taking the helm at Fergus Falls Technical and Community College.

• Five of the top six boys scorers from the 2022-23 season, and seven of the top eight girls, are back this season. The boys are Duluth Marshall's Brooks Johnson (31.4 ppg), Win-E-Mac's Justin Courneya (30.6), St. Cloud Tech's Tameron Ferguson (29.9), New Ulm's Colton Benson (28.6) and Breck's Daniel Freitag (28.5 for Bloomington Jefferson). The girls are Providence Academy's Maddyn Greenway (31.8 ppg), Crosby-Ironton's Tori Oehrlein (31.2), Minnehaha Academy's Addi Mack (28.8), Mountain Iron-Buhl's Jordan Zubich (26.5), Hancock's Kaitlyn Rohlogg (24.5), Holy Family's Jocelyn Land (24.1) and Northome/Kelliher's Kate Thayer (24.0).

Kendall McGree, junior guard (19.9 ppg last year) injured her left knee during the state semifinals and remains sidelined. McGee is out until at least February and possibly for the season, the Star-Tribune reports. Olson, signed by Michigan, is expected to miss four weeks.
