EPIC SHOOT-OUTS

Hawley's Stoa scores 61, Central Cass Holzer's 59; Cass wins 107-99 Pine City's Jusczak hits 63 points, Ogilvie's Heins 61; Ogilvie wins 89-82

Brevin Stoa had a game Saturday that he and his father/coach will always remember. The 6-foot-2 Hawley senior guard pumped in 61 points against Central Cass during a Breakdown border battle series at Moorhead High School.

His herculean effort was not quite enough to win the game, because his AAU teammate, 6-foot-7 forward Cole Holzer, countered with 59 points for Central Cass, leading the North Dakotans to a 107-99 overime win over the Nuggets.

Asked if it seemed like a one-onone shootout had broken out between the two friends, Stoa said that wasn't the case.

"We were both trying our hardest to come out of that game with a win," he reflected. "Neither of us said anything. We just played ball."

Stoa, whose previous high was 36 points, shot 20-for-42 overall, 5-for-13 on three's, and 16-for-20 on free shots, also logging eight deflections, three steals, three assists and just one turnover. He broke the school record of 48 points set by Andrew

Two of the top five single-season point totals in state girls basketball history occurred in the same game Friday, Feb. 9. Grace Heins pumped in 62 points to lead Ogilvie in an 89-82 win at Pine City, a duel for the conference lead. She was not the high scorer in the game. Pine City's Karly Jusczak scorched the nets for 63 points

Heins, a 5-foot-6 senior guard, was 9-for-13 on three's, 21-for-31 overall, and 11-for-15 on free shots, while making nine steals and six assists. Jurczak, a 6-foot-2 senior forward, signed by Idaho, shot 23-for-38 overall, 7-for-11 on three's, and 10-for-14 at the line. She snagged 14 rebounds and made four steals. Averaging 28 points, she broke her own school record of 40 set earlier this season against Sauk Centre when she was 8-for-12 on three's.

Patrick Judd, Pine City coach, was dazzled by what he saw, just like the fans were. "Even in a game where, as a coach, I am focused on trying to win the game, I caught myself looking up at the scoreboard at least a half dozen times saying, 'Man this is unbelievable.'"

Van Havermaet in 2005. He is averaging 26.2 points.

Holzer, who plays with Stoa on Minnesota Comets, was 22-for-31 with two 3-pointers, and 13-for-20 at the line, while nabbing 14 rebounds.

It was a match of .500 teams as Hawley is 10-10 and Central Cass 10-9.

Hawley coach Noah Stoa said it wouldn't have been much use to start double-teaming Holzer "because he was facing up a lot, and, at 6-foot-7, with his passing skills, he was going to find guys, And had guys that had hit shots from the outside." Especially Eli Buhr, who drilled seven 3-pointers.

As for Hawley's offensive approach, he said, "Early it was high pick-and-roll, and they struggled with their screen coverage. Late, they started to face-guard Brevin, so we moved the ball around. He happened to be able to back-cut (against) his deny defender and find his way to the rim or the foul line.

"We didn't care where the baskets were coming from, it just happened that the ball found him often."

Hawley also had Will Baker with 13 points and 10 rebounds, Noah Nelson and Landon Bakke with nine points each, and Nelson and Mark Schauer with nine rebounds each.

Noah Stoa was asked if he enjoyed witnessing the remarkable shootout. "As his father," he responded, "I have yet to be able to see the game through 'dad lenses'. One day, I'll go back and try to watch it all for enjoyment. Saturday, it was about trying to win the game."

On an interesting side note, the coach offered up this anecdote about one of the girls in the adjacent story:

"Brevin and Karly Jusczak of Pine City had their big nights about half a day apart. They were classmates when my wife and I lived in Pine City."

Brevin and Karly were once T-Ball baseball teammates, along with Kloey Lind, currently a two-time MIAC player of the week for St. Scholastica. Noah enjoys looking at their team photo.

"Who would've thought," Stoa mused, "that the PC Garbage Service T-Ball squad was so full of hoopers?"

At half time, each had reached her robust season average. "You would think that both players would cool down, or both coaches would have adjustments," Judd said. "It didn't matter what you did. Both players were 'on.' I had the best seat in the house to watch something that you will probably never see again."

Heins is riding a torrid three-game stretch with 45 points against Mora, 62 against Pine City and 43 against Hill City/Northland, lifting her average to 30.3 per game. "She's been on a tear," said coach Daryl Adickes.

About Friday's shoot-out Heins said, "When my three's kept going in, I was like, whoey! This is really something!" About Jurszak, she said, "It's so hard to guard her -- she can dribble and shoot three's, too. We could not stop her."

The Great River Conference rivals have met twice a year since eighth grade. Pine City (currently 16-8) has always gotten the best of it until this season. In fact, the Lions (21-3) broke Pine City's 60-game conference win streak 82-80 on Jan. 23 when Jusczak had 39 and Heins 31. Ogilvie has finished 9-1 in the GRC for their title in 23 years

"When it was over, I was just so excited that we had won conference. And then somebody told me, I was only five points short of the state record," said Heins.

The state single-game record is 67 by Gianna Kneepkins of Duluth Marshall in a state tournament game in 2021. Prior Lake's McKenna Hofschild had a 63-point game in 2021 and Providence Academy's Maddyn Greenway scored 60 points in a 2023 game.

The MBBN asked both coaches what they tried to do defensively. "Honestly, Ogilvie did not have a player able to guard Karly," said Judd. "Ogilvie seemed to be okay with letting her score inside at first, with help-side defense. Even when they tried to double-team, Karly was able to score." Heins, he said, is always a good shooter but was "absolutely on fire" in this game. They just tried in vain to just block her path. "She scored a lot of her points in transition and off turnovers."

Adickes noted that Pine City played man-to-man but "Grace is just hard to stay in front of," Ogilvie tried man-to-man with some zone "but they killed the zone." The Lions tried to front Jusczak with help over the top. Nothing worked: "She's a load inside, 6-foot-2, then she can step and stroke a three as good as anyone."

Islanders are aiming high

DeLaSalle, ranked first in Class 3A girls since early in the season, is enjoying a nice window of opportunity for a state title run.

The Islanders have four juniors and sophomores in

the starting lineup. Most of last year's lineup returned after a fifth-place finish at state.

"Once again, we have one senior on our roster, so expectations continue to be high, based on our past accomplishments," coach James Fassett said.

"Getting to state should be a goal for everyone, but for us, we want to win that first round game. We felt last year we played a great first half against Benilde but weren't able to sustain that energy in the second half. Once we get over that hurdle, anything can happen."

The Islanders, led by point guard Aneisha Scott, are 20-3 with nine straight wins, and 14-0 in the Tri-Metro Conference with a four-game lead.

They have been ranked first since a 78-65 win in December over Benilde-St. Margaret's, the defending state previous No. 1, when the Red Knights were missing star guard Olivia Olson, who's back now.

Their losses came against Class 4A's top-ranked Hopkins 68-55 and No. 2 Minnetonka 82-57, and Class 2A's No. 2 Minnehaha Academy 61-58.

The key player is Scott, junior point guard, averaging 16.3 points, five assists and three steals. She is a third-

year starter with offers so far from Missouri-Kansas City, Wisconsin-Milwaukee and Illinois State.

"Aneisha really controls the tempo of the game. She is a great decision maker and does whatever is needed," Fassett said. "She has developed the ability to get a shot for herself or anyone else when needed."

Jordyn Johnson, junior forward committed to California-Santa Barbara for volleyball, averages 12.8 points and nine rebounds. Other starters are junior forward Dilan Tubbs (8.1 ppg), sophomore guard Madelyn Blaylark (8.0) and junior forward Arianna Moescher (7.8 ppg). Tubbs has a D-1 offer from Bradley.

DLS went to state last year and placed fifth after losing to BSM in the quarterfinals 64-53. Scott averaged 16.8 ppg, Johnson 11.5, Blaylark 11.8 and Moescher 6.5.

"Our strength is our ability to score at all levels," Fassett said. "We are very strong inside but can also score from the perimeter. We have depth. We play up to 10 players on any given night. We also can give teams multiple looks defensively to disrupt their offensive flow."

Fassett added: "Our goal has been to play more consistently all year from game to game. Maintain energy on both ends of

the floor regardless who we are playing."

Nass, 500 wins at one school

Chawn Naas of Mountain Lake Area/Comfrey Coached his 500th win, 63-51 over Red Rock Central, on Feb. 13 in Lamberton. The current team has a 20-2 record. The North Dakota native has a compiled 500-290 record in 31 seasons as head coach, all at Mountain Lake. The entities he has coached are Mountain Lake, Mountain Lake/Butterfield Odin, Mountain Lake Area, and now Mountain Lake Area/Comfrey. He took teams to state tournaments in 2012, 2013, and 2022, the last one as Class 2A runner-up. Nass has also been head baseball coach for 13 years, head softball coach for 10 years, an assistant in football and baseball, and, the last two years, activities director. In his playing days, he was in all three sports for McVille (ND) High, baseball and basketball at Minnesota-Crookston, and basketball at Bemidji State. Along the way, he and wife Kim raised daughters Taylor (22) and Brooke (18) in Mountain Lake.

Seven players who passed the 2,000-point marker recently have been reported to the MBBN. They are Gabby Fineday, Cass Lake-Bena junior, while scoring 40 points in a 74-58 win over Pine River-Backus; Grayson Okoronkwo, Blake senior guard, while scoring 22 in a 85-75 loss to Maranatha Christian; Cayden Tollesfrud, Mabel-Canton senior, while scoring 24 in a 65-41 win over Grand Meadow; Colton Benson, New Ulm senior, scoring 30 in a 104-74 win over Worthington; Lewis Jones, Goodrich-Grygla-Gatzke senior, scoring 34 in a 87-63 win over Clearbrook/Gonvick; Elizabeth Lukken, Underwood senior, scoring 38 in 78-52 win over Clinton-Graceville-Beardsley; and Addison Hoof, Lester Prairie junior (details not available)

Columbia Heights has been missing three starters for several games and in that span the Hylanders have lost to Mahtomedi, Holy Angels and Spring Lake Park as their record dropped from 12-2 to 14-5. "This is a really good basketball team, when everyone is playing and healthy," coach Willie Braziel said. He expects Randy McClendon (25 points per game) to be back this week, Cam Smith (6.8 ppg) next week and Pierre Stewart (19 ppg) the week after.

DeAndre Holloway, Kerkhoven-Murdock-Sunburg senior, broke a 68-year-old school district career record Monday, scoring 41 points in a 93-57 win over Minnewaska Area to eclipse the mark of 1,425 points by Chuck Lierman that stood since 1956.

Mahtomedi's girls have won 41 straight games in the Metro East Conference. The Zephyrs (15-8 overall) are 11-0 in the MEC this season. They are led by sophomore Anna Greene with 18 points per game, junior Ella Kletti with 11.5 and sophomore Ella Frazier with 9.8.

Mason Dalluge, Battle Lake senior forward, achieved a triple double on Feb. 9 in unusual fashion as it didn't include points. Dalluge scored four points while logging 12 rebounds, 10 assists and 10 blocks, along with six steals, in a 58-54 win over Border West.

Tameron Ferguson, St. Cloud Tech senior guard, scored 46 points in a 73-64 win over Sauk Rapids-Rice on Feb. 8, shooting 16-for-26 on field goals and 11-for-16 on free shots, and followed with 42 against Maple Grove in a 75-70 loss the next night, with Henry Stang countering with 38 for the Crimson.

DeLaSalle was the only Minnesota boys team that won in a Breakdown border series on Saturday, tripping Fargo North 86-75 in overtime with Justin Johnson sinking 28 points and Jaden Morgan 22. Fertile-Beltrami lost to Bismarck Century 65-52, Moorhead lost to West Fargo 100-94,

ushford-Peterson went four overtimes to defeat KSpring Grove 82-79 in a duel of ranked Class 1A boys teams on Saturday at Rushford, shaking off a remarkable comeback by the Lions in the last two seconds of the first extra session. Rushford-Peterson led 62-58 but Spring Grove's Ben Udstuen was fouled on a three-pointer with 1.7 seconds left. He made the first two free shots, and, after a time-out, intentionally missed the third. Ethan Crouch rebounded and missed, but Jaxon Strinmoen tipped it back in before the buzzer, tying the score at 62. The second and third OT's were tied at 66 and 74. Dawson Bunke scored 24 for the Trojans, Cayden Lea 17, Carson Johnson 13, and William LaFleur 11. For the Lions, Strinmoen had 30 points, Udstuen 25, and Jacob Olerud 19. Their top scorer, Elijah Solum, missed the game due to soreness. Al Lohner, Spring Grove assistant, provided these details.


