
# Isaac Asuma's impact at Cherry High goes way beyond basketball

**X** Te like Ike! That was the famous slogan on buttons for a couple presidential campaigns in the 1950's, and they could sell a lot of those same buttons in the Iron, MN area these days, home of the Cherry High School Tigers.

Isaac "Ike" Asuma is best known as the first Minnesota Gophers recruit from the Iron Range in forever, and as the leader of a team that made hoops fans around the state very familiar with a school most had never heard of before.

But in Cherry, Asuma is also admired as a straight-A student, a true teenage gentleman, a kindly mentor to younger kids, and a terrific football and baseball player.

The 6-foot-2 point guard,

handsome, clean cut, muscular, graceful, calm and composed, has led Cherry to the state Class 1A semi- ball player, but the traits he possesses off the court is final the past two seasons. He recently passed the what amazes me." 3,000-point marker and has accumulated 850 assists and 1,150 rebounds.

And, by the way, he is one of several fine players on a team that includes a younger brother and cousin. The Tigers have been ranked first in 1A since the opening tipoff. They've gone 83-21 in his four seasons.

His exceptional athletic ability shows through in all sports. Said football coach Jason Marsh: "If we threw a 50/50 ball to Ike, it was really a 90/10 ball for him."

Basketball coach Jordan Christianson, asked what impresses him about Asuma, chose to focus on intangibles: "What amazes me is how well rounded he is as a person. He is humble and always puts others first. He is always willing to help out with whatever, and is a great role model for our younger students. He takes the time to get to know people when he is approached and has a conversation with them. He is obviously a great basket-

fan site interview, Asuma responded: "I would describe myself a point guard who does a little of everything, who can shoot from outside and get to the rim, and I'm a very good passer and I can play defense."

Minnesota coach Ben Johnson, upon signing Asuma last March, said the Gophers are getting "a proven winner" with competitive edge and toughness, great skill levels and "a tremendous amount of pride," along with being a quality person from a great family. "Isaac will give maximum effort from the first day he's on campus.

Asuma has been listed as either the No. 2 or 3 prospect in the state and fielded offers from Texas Christian, Hampton, Minnesota-Duluth, Iowa State, Nebraska, Xavier and Butler. He chose the Gophers "because of my relationship with Ben Johnson," adding, "I truly believe in the Gophers future and that I can help them turn the program around."

He is thrilled to help give Cherry High, with 34 students in his class, 191 miles north of Minneapolis, a team locals can be proud of. "The first time we stepped on the court at Williams Arena, my sophomore year, and saw everyone in the stands wearing orange, that was crazy, to see how much community support Cherry had."

Asuma is currently averaging 18.2 points, eight assists, seven rebounds, and 2.6 blocked shots per game, shooting 59 percent from the floor and 81 percent at the line. He is distributing more this year after averaging 21 points, 8.8 rebounds, 6.5 assists and 2.6 steals as a junior, and 27 points, 9.5 rebounds, seven steals and three assists as a sophomore. Both of those teams finished 27-6 with fourth place at state.

Cherry would be a solid team even without the future Gopher who is not even their scoring leader. That's junior guard Noah Sundquist with 20.3 per game. Freshman Isaiah Asuma (Isaac's cousin) averages 13.8 points, junior Carson Brown 13.4 and sophomore Noah Asuma (Isaac's brother) 12.8. Cherry is currently 17-2, losing to two Class 4A teams: top ranked Park Center 92-73 and Forest Lake 69-65, over the holidays. The Tigers edged Holy Family Catholic, one of the top 2A teams, 73-69, with Asuma playing stout defense against both a star guard and post, and had one other close win, over Superior (WI) 53-51, both in December. Otherwise, their closest game was 75-62 over Cass Lake-Bena, with the other games all blowouts by 30 to 70 points.

Baseball was Asuma's first love. He hit .424 for the Tigers as a freshman, led with 14 extra-base hits and was one of the starting pitchers on a 15-8 team. "It was the sport I thought I was going to play in college," he told

the Star-Tribune, "until eighth grade when COVID hit, and then it switched to basketball." Asuma did not play baseball the last two years but he will rejoin the Tigers this spring now that he's done with AAU basketball.

Coach Brian Kemp looks forward to that. Last summer, he noted, when Asuma found time for some baseball, he went 4-for-5 with three doubles in his first game back after being away for two years. "He can play anywhere. He is a smooth infielder and covers a ton of ground in the outfield. He has a high baseball IQ from growing up on a baseball field." Kemp added, "He's a great student and even a better person. He makes people around him better and has always been a leader and role model to everyone in our community."

As for football, there was some question about whether Asuma would rejoin the team this fall, due to his basketball commitments, but he ultimately decided that he'd never have another chance to play football and eagerly suited up. He earned his third all-conference award and was named state Nine-Man receiver of the year. He caught 38 passes for 492 yards and nine touchdowns, plus seven two-point passes, and on defense made 72 tackles, two interceptions and two forced fumbles, helping Cherry post a 9-2 record. He was a running back/receiver as a junior on an 8-2 team, rolling up 449 yards and five TD's on the ground, averaging 9.2 per carry, while snagging 27 passes for 438 yards and eight touchdown and making five interceptions.

Football coach Marsh also had praise for Asuma's sports IQ. "He knew the assignment of every player on he field. Also, he garnered a lot of double covering this year and yet had more receptions than last year." If not for his commitment to basketball, Marsh said, "He could be an excellent college receiver. He runs great routes and has such great leaping ability."

# Took a while but Hornets are humming now

Edina's boys team started the season with high hopes, returning four of the top six from a 15-12 team. The Hornets were a bit stunned when they struggled to a 1-4 start, albeit against some strong teams.

However, the Hornets have found their groove to win seven of their last eight, including conquests of a pair of top-five ranked teams, Hopkins and Minnetonka. With an 11-7 ledger now, the Hornets moved up to No. 11 in the Class 4A rankings this week.

"I think the biggest difference in the past couple weeks has been our guys buying into our defensive system and committing to playing aggressively and extremely hard," coach Jon Bryant said. "Our defensive pressure has led to some easier baskets on offense and increased our pace of play."

Their shooting percentage has also gone up "due in

part to getting some early looks in transition, but also through some adjustments we made offensively."

Also hampering the Hornets early was a good problem: some of their athletes were football players who went to the Prep Bowl, so they started late and needed some time for their legs to adjust to basketball. The team also had some illness early and didn't field their full squad until the fourth game.

Edina enjoys excellent scoring balance with 6-foot-8 junior forward Daniel Molhoek averaging 14.4 points, senior guard Josiah Coleman 13.9, senior guard Owen Kemper 9.6, senior guard Waylon Erlandson 9.0 and junior guard Billy DeMars

9.0. Meanwhile, Bryant said, the Hornets can rely on their defense to keep them in games when the offense isn't clicking.

In the 83-80 win over Minnetonka on Jan. 26, Kemper and Molhoek sank 22 points each and Coleman 17. Coleman had 20, Molhoek 13, Erlandson 12 and Kemper 11 in the 75-69 win over Hopkins on Jan. 16. The Hornets beat one of the top 3A teams, Orono, 72-60 on Jan. 27 with DeMars and Coleman hitting 16 points each and Kemper 14.

"We came into the season with high expectations," Bryant said. "We thought we could compete with the best teams in the Lake Conference and make a run in the playoffs. With the elevated expectations came additional pressure, magnifying our early struggles. I think we needed some adversity to realize we needed to commit to the process on a daily basis."

The Hornets hope to be playing in some big games in March. Bryant knows a lot about big games. A 6-foot-2 guard from Armstrong, Bryant helped the Wisconsin Badgers reach the Final Four in 2000; in fact, he was named MVP of the West Regional. He had a brief stint professionally in the CBA.

After returning to Minnesota, he started getting requests from prep players and their parents to work with them, and from that he started a business as a basketball trainer that he continued for around 15 years. But he eventually realized he "missed being part of a team" and joined the Wayzata staff under Bryan Schnettler, whom he'd met from training some of the Trojan players. He was head coach at his alma mater, Armstrong, for three years, and then to Edina, where he's in his third season.



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# Hopkins tips Tonka in 1-2 duel

Hopkins reclaimed its customary No. 1 spot in the girls 4A rankings after handing Minnetonka its first loss of the season 79-62 on Tuesday in Minnetonka. Tatum Woodson netted 23 points, Liv McGill 22 and Lauren Hillesheim 18 for the Hornets (17-2), who roared to a 46-26 halftime lead. Aaliyah Crump sank 30 for Minnetonka (18-1), and Lanelle Wright and Tori McKinney 13 a piece. Hopkins took the lead in the Lake Conference, which literally has a stronger field than the state tournament every year, currently with five of the top six teams in the rankings. Hopkins is 6-0 and Minnetonka 5-1 in the Lake. They will meet again in the conference finale Feb. 23.

#### **AROUND THE STATE**

Tori Oehrlein of Crosby-Ironton became the first sophomore in the state ever to reach 3,000 career points when she scored 27 on Tuesday during a 93-75 loss at Providence Academy. The 5-foot-11 guard reached the milestone on the first basket of the game. Maddyn Greenway, who will soon become the second sophomore to reach 3,000, led the Lions' with 35 points. Oehrlein reached 3,000 in a record 101 games. Next-fastest was Kierah Kimbrough of Badger-Greenbush-Middle River (2005) in 112 games. The state record-holder for career points, Rebekah Dahlman of Braham, got to 3,000 her junior year and finished with 5,060 after a couple of monster state tournaments.

Delano girls were 17-0 before St. Peter (16-1) felled the Tigers 71-67 in overtime on Saturday with Rhyan Holmgren sinking 25 points and Annika Southworth hitting a key 3-pointer in the OT. With losses by Delano and Minnetonka, there are no remaining undefeated girls teams.

Blooming Prairie boys were 17-0 before Winona Cotter/Hope Lutheran (13-4) tripped the Blossoms 61-60 behind Gabe Stewart with 22 points on Saturday. That leaves just two undefeated boys teams: Breck and Red Lake County.

Four girls basketball luminaries have been named to the Girls Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame. They are Liz Carpentier, president of the GBBCA and the All Star Series; Michelle Goodman, coach at Eagan and Farmington; Jeremy Post, coach at White Bear Lake; and Ben Lofgren, Hawley assistant coach.

Tresa Baumgard of Chisholm is now the all-time state girls leader in rebounds. Coach Pam Pioske reported that the 6-foot senior has 1,791 rebounds at this writing. The previous record was 1,736 held since 2010 by Sari Noga of Parkers Prairie, who went on to play for the Gophers. Matt Pederson, state record keeper, noted the that rebound record has been held by only four players. Janet Karvonen of New York Mills graduated in 1980 with 1,433 rebounds. Janice Streit of Eden Valley-Watkins took it over in 1984 with 1,608, which stood for 26 years until Noga broke it. Baumgard, we recently noted in MBBN, also broke Chisholm's career points record that had stood since 1984.

Hancock (18-1) has three girls with over 1,000 points as senior Kaitlyn Staples reached the milestone on Jan. 27, joining senior Misti Zemple, who got there Dec. 29, and junior Kaitlyn Rohloff, who reached 1,000 last year.

Wayzata and Hopkins each scored over 100 points and it wasn't even an overtime game Tuesday. Wayzata prevailed 103-101 — taking its first lead with eight-tenths of a second left on a three-point play by Jordan Cain — after trailing 60-43 at halftime. "Tale of two halves," reflected Wayzata coach Bryce Tesdahl. "We kept on chipping away ... Fortunately, we were able to get enough stops and scores to overcome a big first half deficit. Credit to our kids." Cain and Greyson Uelman netted 30 points each and Andy Stefanwicz 19 for Wayzata. Anthony Smith sank 32 points, Jayden Moore 25 and Tyson Moore 18 for Hopkins.


# Of Heroes and 'Hovering' Teams

People who run tournaments work hard to get facilities and staffing and officials, but most importantly, they need teams and "heroes" - coaches or parents - to lead them...and REGISTER the teams - early.

It won't be a surprise to hear that the only 1000+ win girls' coach, Mike Dreier of New London-Spicer, has put in the most Pacesetter teams over 30 years - one for every grade annually for decades. They have

been to a record number of state tournaments as a varsity team. Jeff Buffetta at MIB is following that example and has made 8 state trips in 9 years, claiming the Class A title last March...and the list goes on.



Coaches, if you want success, get to know your young players, let them know you care, and get them involved early and often.

What tournament directors don't want is "hovering teams." Here's why: We had a tournament with two teams registered on a Friday while there were six teams "hovering" and asking "How many teams?" When they heard two teams, none of the six teams registered, due to "not enough teams" according to their hovering minds. Had they all registered, we would have had a wonderful eight-team tournament, great for everyone.

We are trying something different this year. We are publishing the lists of the teams that have stepped up and registered early. Each Friday in MN Basketball News, we'll publish the regional lists along with the growing number of schools participating and the total number of teams **registered**. As of today, we have 203 teams from 93 different schools due to their heroes behind the scenes. We are about 33 percent registered. See the lists on pages 9-18.

All regions for grades 4-7 are limited to eight teams. All Super Sections for grades 8-9 involving two regions are limited to 16 teams.

We started in 1993 with 400 teams. We increased quickly to 600 and 800 and almost 900, then settled back to 600-700. We added fourth grade and had about 750 teams in 2019 BC – Before COVID. We are working hard to build this system back to 600-plus teams. We need a **team effort** from head coaches, youth basketball associations, parents, and and even players, so please help promote it in every way you can.

With more players being pulled toward AAU teams earlier each year, it is important for school basketball programs throughout Minnesota to hold the line for **School Team Basketball** as long as possible – like April 7 please. Parents need to support the home team as their child's first priority. Encouraging loyalty to home teammates first will be a great life lesson.

#### **BENEFITS**

- **Playing together** binds players to their team at a young age.
- **Team results** are more important than individuals standing out.
- **The school team** is the most important team, as it should be.

The Pacesetter eight-region playoffs provide all Minnesota school/community teams with a chance to play off for a true over-all Minnesota championship and to gain entry into a five-state championship at the Target Center, which gives school/community teams a chance for a big-time experience.

Playing on a non-school team should be an "extra," if and when not enough teammates can form a team. But should school team players be splitting up right after their seasons instead of forming teams with their teammates? Should parents be encouraging it? **The Team** is always more important than any individual. And, about that college scholarship parents think they can get through AAU ball - college coaches are very intelligent and thorough. They recognize loyalty and seek out players who are great teammates. They want that loyalty on their team.

I think of Isaac Asuma of Cherry scoring 15 when he could score 35. The Gopher coaches understand exactly who he is and what he offers a team and offered

# WHA's Lien: 724 wins & soldiering on

Jim Lien, Walker-Hackensack-Akeley coach who has logged 724 wins over 37 years, stays on the job despite a bout with cancer in recent years leaving him with a cane and a shuffle but still resolute at age 78.

"Coaching with cancer has been a real challenge," Lien said, "but having two great (assistant) coaches, Pat Richter and Katie Benjamin, and a great bunch of girls, have made the season a great one."

The Wolves are currently 14-5 and presented Lien with his 600th girls win against Chisholm on Jan. 9. "We are looking forward to the rest of the season and hopefully will make a deep playoff run."

Lien, a 2004 inductee in the state girls coaches Hall of Fame, has a 605-339 ledger with girls teams and was 119-60 with boys teams, nabbing 14 conference championships. Lien has also coached football, baseball and volleyball and had a state tourney team in volleyball with Akeley in 1984. His best hoops teams were the 1983-84 boys with a 20-3 re-





cord, the 1988-89 boys who were 22-3, the 1989-90 girls who went 21-3, the 2017-18 girls who went 24-6, and the 2018-19 girls who finished 27-3 with three 1,000-point scorers.

The retired elementary school teacher was a baseball, basketball and football athlete in high school with the Westbrook Wildcats in southwestern Minnesota. He played town team baseball, in which he enjoyed two state tournament trips.

Along the way, he has coached his daughter Lindsey (a PA at Hartford Medical Center in Connecticut) in basketball and his son Mike (a corporate officer in Fargo) in baseball and football.

Asked about his most notable players, he listed Brianna Raddatz (2,020 points), Ellen Kramer, Sarah Nigel, Aubrey Morrison and current assistant Katie Benjamin, while his boys list includes current head coaches Byron Negen (Rock Ridge girls) and Scott Kramer (Nevis boys) along with DJ Mueller, Cy Truss and Barry Negen.
