Which boys' state prep stars are best bets for the next level?

Terry Kunze is a former Gopher guard who has coached in the college and professional ranks. He follows all levels of basketball. MBBN asked for his impressions of players and teams this season.

There are ten players graduating this season who I believe will have a nice career at the next level. Most have already committed to colleges. Here are a few who have impressed me.

Chase Thompson, 6-8, Alexandria (Clemson) — Great athletic skills to be outstanding at the next level. Leads Alexandria which has a good chance to reach state.

Tommy Ahneman, 6-11, Cretin-Derham Hall (Notre Dame) — Last year's North Dakota player of the year is college-ready with all the tools to step in and play as a freshman. Leads the No. 1 ranked team.

Nolan Groves, 6-5, Orono (Yale) — I feel he can be a factor at Yale as a freshman. Big scorer on a very good team. He can shoot it and put it on the floor. Strong and skilled.

Jalen Wilson, 6-8, Benilde-St. Margaret's (Northern Iowa) — I feel he is ready to play as a fresh-

man. Much improved over last season. Leads Benilde, the favorite in their section.

CJ Armstrong, 6-3, Richfield (Augustana) — A scorer! He can shoot and drive, excellent one-on-one player who can create his own shot. He should start at Augustana as a freshman.

Tyler Wagner, 6-6, Champlin Park — Athletic 6-6 guard, good shooter with strength that will work for D-1 but has not committed yet.

Miles Newton, 6-5, Breck — A real athlete with size and strength playing in Class 2A. They will play anyone anywhere big time.

Anthony Smith, 6-1, Hopkins — Shooter, shooter, shooter. He has added a solid 20 pounds and improved his

ball handling skills and defense under a great coach.

Gandon Gosch, 6-5, Mankato East (Minnesota-Mankato) — Aggressive and skills, he should be ready to step in right away.

Brogan Madson, 6-1, Mankato East — talented guard, strong, great quicks, ready to play.

Jackson CC's Cother has 61-point game

Rylie Cother, Jackson County Central senior, exploded for 61 points in a 95-78 win over Maple River on Jan. 27. (The state record is 67 by Gianna Kneepkens of Duluth Marshall). The 6-foot point guard was 25for-39 on field goals, 3-for-6 on three's, and 8-for-11 at the line, while logging six steals and six rebounds. Her previous high was 53 as a sophomore. She passed 2,000 points and became her school's all-time scoring leader mid-January. The Winona State recruit followed with 38 points against Pipestone in which she hurt her ankle but came back to score 53 with 14 rebounds in an 86-82 win over Belle Plaine. JCC is 16-6 with 13 straight wins.

- CJ Armstrong of Richfield scored 53 points in a 113-92 loss to Hopkins, 38 in a 92-78 loss to Orono, and 42 in an 81-79 loss to DeLa-Salle. He's averaging 33 points for the Spartans (14-4).
- Emily Anderson, Martin County West senior, scored a school record 46 points in a 62-52 win over Maple River on Jan. 3. That's one point more than her brother Zach, who has the boys record of 45. Anderson also had a 40-point game this year. The 6-foot forward is close to 1,900 career points.
- Griffin Epema of Montevideo had a quadruple double 17 points, 12 rebounds, 14 assists, and 10 steals in an 80-59 win over Redwood Valley on Jan. 14.
- Luke Means of Redwood Valley became the 5th boys basketball player in state history with back to back 50 or more point games. He scored 54 against Luverne on Jan 21 and 54 against Windom on Jan 24, Means is averaging 30.4 points, 4.6 assists, and 4.7 rebounds and leading state with 123 made 3-pointers.

Lester Prairie star breaks legend's record

Lester Prairie's school record for career points stood for 43 years before senior Addison Hoof broke Kay Konerza's mark of 2,715 when she scored 38 points on

Jan. 17 in a win over Cedar Mountain at home.

Konerza, a 1982 graduate, was one of the state's first blue-chip recruits and played for Louisiana Tech, a power at the time, and eventually settled in Texas as a teacher. She also had a 56-point game that was the state record until 2018 and led the Bulldogs to their lone state tourney appearance.

Hoof, a point guard committed to Minnesota-Mankato, is averaging 33.6 points, third in the state, and has made 115 steals, fourth in the state.

Hoof told the local paper, the Herald-Journal, "It's really cool. I've heard a little bit about her (Konerza) and I know she was really good. I have some relatives who knew her and they all say she was amazing. It's just really cool that I can be up there with her."

Oehrlein and Greenway each reach 4,000 points

Tori Oehrlein, Crosby-Ironton junior, reached the 4,000-point marker while scoring 42 points in a 110-27 win over East Central on Jan. 28. Maddyn Greenway, Providence Academy junior, got her 4,000th while scoring 38 points in a 101-68 win over St. Michael-Albertville on Feb. 1. Those two joined Addi Mack, Minnehaha Academy senior, who reached 4,000 in January. They are 2-3-4 in career scoring behind Braham's Rebekah Dahlman, who had 5,060. Mack is averaging 33.6 points, Greenway 32.2 and Oehrlein 31.3. Mack has committed to Maryland, Greenway to Kentucky and Oehrlein to Minnesota.

Alex boys, BSM girls win in high-profile double header

Two duels of Class 3A powers took place in Alexandria on Jan. 25 when the Benilde-St. Margaret's boys and girls teams visited.

The Alexandria boys won 83-80, the first loss for BSM, which was 11-0 and ranked first. Alex guard Mason Witt shot 6-for-11 on three's and totaled 23 points while his cousin Talen Witt drilled 22 points, shooting 9-for-18. Gavin Roderick added 19 points and Chase Thompson 17. For BSM, Jaleel Donley sank 26 points, Jalen Wilson 25, and TJ Stuttley 15.

"BSM has a nice team. Our kids made timely plays throughout the game," Alex coach Forrest Witt said. "This was a state tournament level game with a bunch of excellent players on both sides."

The BSM girls, defending state champions, cruised 79-53 over Alexandria, which placed third in the state last year and has everybody back. Kendall McGee sank 23 points, Pressley Watkins 17, Sydney Friendly 13 and Kate Kapsner 12. For Alex, which had won nine straight, Hadley Thul logged 18 points and 18 rebounds.

BSM bounces back, trips Orono

The BSM boys had another high-profile clash on Jan. 30 and won that one 76-72 over Orono, the team that's beaten them in the last two Section 6AAA finals. The Red Knights overcame a 45-point barrage by Orono's Nolan Groves, the state's leading scorer. Jaleel Donley scored 19 points, including seven late as the lead kept changing hands, while TJ Stuckey added 17 and Jalen Wilson 12. Brady Wooley had 14 for Orono.

"Our focus on defensive intensity clearly paid off, as we were able to disrupt the opposing team's rhythm and force turnovers," said BSM coach Tim Ellefson. Looking ahead, he said, "Consistent rebounding and

6 boys, 6 girls' teams unbeaten

Twelve teams -- six boys' teams and six girls' teams -- remain undefeated as of the first week of February. Five girls teams absorbed their first loss last week.

The Cretin-Derham Hall boys' 18-0 record — they've been No. 1 in Class 4A all season — includes wins over Class 3A powers Alexandria 77-71, Orono 75-65, and Totino-Grace 82-77. The Raiders haven't played a 4A top-ten team. Their closest conference win was 63-49 over Mounds View.

Also unbeaten in Class 4A is Tartan, which also hasn't played a ranked 4A team. The Titans (19-0) pulled out close wins over Hastings 73-71 and Eagan 66-63 recently to stay unscathed.

Albany in Class 2A and Cherry in Class 1A, also No. 1 ranked all season, are unbeaten, along with Waseca, ranked No. 2 behind Albany in 2A, and Southland in Class 1A.

Albany, 17-0, has beaten everyone by double digits except Pequot Lakes 63-58. Waseca is 20-0 and their closest game was 72-63 over St. Peter. Cherry is 20-0 and has beaten No. 2 Dawson-Boyd 70-64 (their only single-digit win) and No. 3 Nevis 74-59. Southland is 20-0 with every win by double digits, but they are not ranked in the Top 10.

The only unbeaten girls' team in the top two classes is Monticello in 3A, after Marshall, which was 18-0, lost to Orono 59-56 last week. Monticello is 20-0 with their closest games being 69-58 over Elk River, 87-79 over St. Michael-Albertville, and 69-59 over Delano, all in the first two weeks of the season.

Providence Academy is 21-0, including wins over three of the top 4A teams (Maple Grove, Hopkins and St. Michael-Albertville.)

Crosby-Ironton is 21-0 after thumping No. 3-ranked

Minnehaha Academy 85-65 at home on Saturday. Each team has a 4,000-point scorer, but Minnehaha's Addi Mack missed the game. Tori Oehrlein had 40 points for the Rangers.

New London-Spicer is 21-0 after holding off Annandale 53-47 last week. Their only other close game was against Minnewaska Area, 54-47. A fourth unbeaten 2A team is Royalton at 19-0, their closest games against Milaca 61-53 and Belgrade-Brooten-Elrosa 62-53.

Sauk Centre was 17-0 before losing to Minnewaska Area 51-48 last week. NLS had both Sauk Centre and Crosby-Ironton on the schedule the last two years but not this year.

There are no unbeatens in Class 1A. Hillcrest Lutheran was 17-0 before losing to Wheaton-Herman-Norcross (12-7) in a shootout 93-88 last week. Sleepy Eye-St. Mary's was 18-0 before losing to Mayer Lutheran (17-2) by 65-54 last week.

It could be Crimson's year

Taple Grove, a program seeking its first state girls VI basketball title, has been ranked No. 1 in Class 4A for several weeks with a close-knit senior group that's played together since grade school. The Crimson, led by Jordan Ode, are 19-2 with 12 straight wins.

"We are definitely in the conversation with the top teams in Class 4A," coach Mark Cook said. "We have a veteran group that is very driven to build what we accomplished last year. We have played a tough schedule and competed with the top teams."

The Crimson were 25-4 last and season placed fourth in the state tournament, the program's top finish ever.

Opening the season against three of the state's top teams, they beat current No. 3 Eden Prairie 77-73, lost to Providence Academy (ranked first in all classes by the Star-Tribune) current No. 5 Wayzata 56-55. Their other loss

sure she can beat you in different ways."

A strong No. 2 scorer is Kate Holmquist, junior guard committed to Montana, averaging 14.4 points.

The next three scorers are senior triplets Lexi Hanna with 9.8 ppg, Bella Hanna 8.0 ppg, and Addie Hanna 7.4 ppg. Addie will play for Augustana, Bella for Michigan Tech and Lexi for Missouri-St. Louis.

"They are incredible. Their games are very different, but they complement each other so well," said Cook,

citing Addie as the "heady floor general," Bella "playing for bigger than she is down low" while also hitting three's, and Lexi as "the one who does all the little things" including screens and rebounding. All three are "tenacious defenders," he added.

With Sophie Anderson, a junior, adding 7.2 ppg, the Crimson can truly score from all around the dial. "They are

was to Hopkins 59-55 on Dec. 28. Hopkins has four losses and is ranked second. Since the loss to Hopkins, the Crimson have won 12 straight including conquests of No. 7 St. Michael-Albertville 78-47, No. 8 Minnetonka 72-40, and Class 3A power Alexandria 70-49.

Their star is Jordan Ode, a Michigan State recruit. A 6-footer who can play any position, she is usually at point guard or wing. She's averaging 24 points and has gone past 2,000 in her career. She's rated the state's top senior recruit, and ranked by ESPN as one of the nation's top 35. Cook calls her an amazing all-around player: "She has worked so hard on her skill set to make

the most complete shooting team I have ever coached," Cook said.

They all grew up together in the youth program, and it shows in how well they play together, he pointed out.

"We have to keep working, keep improving, and take care of what we have in front of us before we start thinking about the state tournament," Cook said. First, the Crimson want to nail down a fourth straight Northwest Suburban title — they've won 64 straight conference games — before moving into the mighty Lake Conference next year.



Honors for Lien, Cosgriff

Jim Lien and Brian Cosgriff have received honors from the Minnesota Girls Basketball Coaches Association. Lien, longtime Walker-Hackensack-Akeley coach, got the Carl Pierson Legacy Award Winner for 2025 for career dedication. Lien, 78, in his 47th year of coach, has over 750 wins and had his first state tournament team last uear. He continues to coach despite battling cancer with the help of capable assistants. Cosgriff got the John Wooden Coach of the Year award for 2025. Cosgriff coached Minnetonka to the state champion-ship last season. He had seven state championshps with Hopkins and holds the highest career winning percentage of any coach.

Oxton wins 700th with Lakeville North

John Oxton, Lakeville North boys coach for 33 seasons, reached the 700-win marker on Jan. 31 when the Panthers won at Farmington 74-56. He's one of just six boys coaches with 700 or more wins.

Oxton has taken 12 teams to the state tournament — two with Lakeville, ten with Lakeville North -- with a state championship in 2014 and three runner-up teams. He also had a state champion team at a small Montana school, Gardomer, in 1989. His current team has a 12-7 record.

Top 100 Camp news

Pacesetter recently contacted invitees from our Top 100 Camp last summer to ask about any season highlights they would like to report. Some responses ---Julia Schmidt broke the Wheaton-Herman-Norcross scoring record (which was 1,720) while scoring 20 against Ashby. Her teammate Rachel Spilde made eight 3-points vs. Rothsay, breaking the team record by one ... Lauren Hust, Rochester Lourdes junior, got her 1,000th point Jan. 30 ... Ma'lon McCoy, St. Agnes sophomore, had 26 points, 11 rebounds and three blocks against CHOF Ashby senior Easton Nelson had a 45-point game Libby Suckert of Park Christian got her 1,000th point Anna Nevens of Mt. Iron-Buhl hit six 3-pointers in a win over Braham, and six in the first half in a win over Sacred Heart (after, she reports, the bus broke down on the highway and the boys bus had to pick them up) Aniyah Thomas of MIB had 25 points (5-for-8 on three's) against Kelliher and nine steals against Grand Rapids Lilly Hendrickson of BOLD has missed two weeks with injury but on Jan. 16 had 18 points and 3 steals vs. Mayer Lutheran ... Trinity Baker of Underwood had six three's and 25 points in a close loss and had a four-game stretch with 80 points and 12-for-25 on three's ... Ole Skrien of St. Croix Academy had 17 points in a win over Fridley ... Quentin Guanella of Alden-Conger got his 1,000th point while scoring 22 against Mankao Loyola

Making a Case for allowing a 6th Personal Foul and dropping the 1-and-1

This is a drop in the ocean, but sometimes a lot of drops starts a wave.

I believe individual players should be allowed 6 fouls instead of the current 5. Here are my reasons:

- 1) First of all, there is no other sport that removes a player from a game when committing unintentional contact. Intentional contact is a different story. But in basketball, you can be trying to play the correct way by taking a charge, for example...and get a foul.
- 2) The game of basketball was created by James Naismith as an indoor winter game for football players. You can imagine the contact made by football players! It is no wonder the 5-foul rule was installed. But basketball became a sport of its own so the need to expel a player for five fouls was no longer needed to assure the safety of others. Intentional fouls or flagrant fouls can be treated the same way they are today with two shots and possession.
- 3) Since basketball is a team game, why should it make any difference which player makes the foul? It is team defense. If the penalty is severe enough, it shouldn't matter which player fouls.
- 4) When a player gets two fouls early, it can affect playing time in the first quarter or first half. Three fouls mid-game or four fouls later in the game can also affect playing time. If 6 fouls were allowed, these limitations wouldn't occur.
- 5) Small schools or teams with a limited roster or teams dependent on one key player are disproportionately affected when playing time is affected. Losing minutes from a key player can cause a team to lose a key playoff game. Teams with a limited roster can find themselves in a very embarrassing situation not having five players to finish the game. That circumstance is disrespectful to the game and uncomfortable for both teams and the spectators.
- 6) All of these issues could be alleviated by simply adding one personal foul. What's the harm? If a player fouls excessively early, the bonus rule will penalize the team. If a player fouls intentionally, the two-shot rule will penalize the foul.

7) In Minnesota, small schools are getting smaller – and even some large schools are struggling to fill out their rosters. Community college teams also struggle to have more than eight players in many

cases. Adding the 6th foul or even eliminating the player elimination for personal fouls would be much more of a blessing than a detriment.

8) Another plus is that the 6th foul takes pressure off officials, and that's good for everyone.

I tried implementing my own special foul rules in the early days of our Pacesetter tournaments because I believed in it so strongly. If I remember right, reaching 7 fouls was two shots – we have never used the 1-and-1 - and reach-

ing 12 fouls was two shots and possession, the same as a technical foul. Individuals could not foul out. When teams reached the 12th foul, it was a killer for them because that rule also eliminated the intentional fouls late in the game. Teams couldn't get the ball back when behind late in the game, unless they stole it. There was no longer a benefit to foul – which there should never be. Penalize the fouls enough, and it doesn't matter who fouls.

Coaches reacted differently. Most understood the reasoning, but too many coaches felt it wasn't right to use this system when the rules of basketball during their seasons weren't the same. I eventually gave in. But we use the 6-foul rule for our varsity games, and I haven't heard one negative comment about it. The teams with small rosters have been very apreciative.

Added Note on Bonus Shots

The rules of the game have often changed to improve. The game originally involved a jump ball after every made basket. Into the 1970's the first five fouls in a half resulted in one free throw being given to the team fouled – so the team got one free throw instead of possession. The average number of points per possession is about 1.1, so getting one free throw – which would result .6 for 60% shooting – was more of a disadvantage to the team being fouled. Now teams get possession instead. The 1-and-1 free throw produces .96 points for 60% shooting, so that is a disadvantage for a team averaging 1.1 per possession. Two shots provides 1.2 points for 60% shooting and 1.4 for a 70% shooting. That's a good reason to eliminate the 1-and-1 and give teams two shots in the bonus. It's easier for scorekeepers and officials too.
