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Paige Bueckers closes at UConn with "Destiny" Championship

Paige Bueckers, in her decade of basketball brilliance, on two teams that each hold the record for most championships, had experienced just one championship herself — until this past weekend.

The UConn senior guard from Hopkins scored 17 points as the Huskies pummeled South Carolina 82-59 for the NCAA title Sunday, which was UConn's 12th, but first since 2016.

Bueckers called it 'extremely fitting" and "destiny," in a USA Today report. "Obviously, I have a great faith, so I believe God planned it perfectly in the way that it went out."

Bueckers also had six rebounds, three assists, and two blocks while senior Azzi Fudd and freshman Sarah Strong each scored 24 points for the Huskies (37-3).

UConn also romped in the semifinals Friday, over UCLA 85-51 with Bueckers scoring 16 points. In the Spokane Regional, she had a careerhigh 40 points in an 82-59 win over Oklahoma, then 31 points in a 78-64 win over USC in the finals.

In her five seasons at UConn, her teams were 158-23, although she

missed 59 of those games with injuries. Her freshman year, she was an instant sensation, sweeping all four major Player of the Year awards. The Huskies were upset by Arizona in the semifinals at the Final Four. They lost in the finals the next year and the semifinals the last two years.

Bueckers, who averaged 19.9 points and 4.6 assists in 123 career games, will enter the WNBA draft and is expected to go No. 1.

"Seeing UConn win the national championship and Paige hoist the trophy was truly a moment of pride and joy," said Brian Cosgriff, who coached her at Hopkins. "She has overcome so many obstacles while never giving up. It's been nothing short of inspiring."

Hopkins, in her five years as a starter, went 151-8. They lost in the state finals during her 8th, 9th, and 10th grade years, to Minnetonka, Elk River and Eastview. The Royals were 62-0 her last two seasons and beat Stillwater for the 2019 title. In 2020, they were in the finals against Farmington, whom they had beaten badly earlier, but the tournament was halted due to the emergence of Covid-19. That 2019 state title was Hopkins' eighth, tying Rochester Lourdes for the most. The Royals won their ninth crown this year.

Maple Grove's Ode is Miss BB

Jordan Ode, who led Maple Grove to two state tournaments and a runner-up finish this season, was named Miss Basketball on April 4 during the coaches association all-star weekend at Carleton College.

The 5-foot-11 combo guard -- signed by Michigan State -- averaged 25 points and excelled in all facets of the game. Her team finished 28-3 and lost to Hopkins in the state finals. She averaged 21 points as a junior when the Crimson reached the state semifinals and placed fourth. She has scored more than 2,300 career points.

"I hope I've left a legacy for the younger girls to follow when they get to the level that I'm at," Ode told the Star-Tribune. "The biggest thing I can do is inspire the next generation of girls basketball players at Maple Grove."

The other finalists were Hope Counts of Providence Academy, Addison Mack of Minnehaha Academy, Kendall McGee of Benilde-St. Margaret's, Aneisha Scott of DeLaSalle and Hadley Thul of Alexandria Area.

Thompson, who'll play for Clemson, previously received the Mr. Basketball Award. He averaged 25 points and 10 rebounds for the Class 3A state champions.

Groves, who led the state in scoring with 34.2 points per game and led Orono to a third-place finish at state, will play for Yale.

The other finalists were Tommy Ahneman of Cretin-Derham Hall, CJ Armstrong of Richfield, Isa El-Amin of Minnetonka, Sam Hondl of Albany, Brogan Madson of Mankato East, Anthony Smith III of Hopkins and Chase Watley of Totino-Grace.

Gophers win WBIT title

The Minnesota Gopher women did not make the NCAA field but won the Women's Basketball Invitational Tournament and finished the season 25-11.

The Gophers were 5-0 in the tournament. They beat Toledo 65-53, Missouri State 78-71, and Gonzaga 82-77 in overtime to reach the semifinals.

The Gophers beat Belmont 75-63 in the final on April 2 in Indianapolis. Tori McKinney, freshman from Hopkins, scored 26 points, her season high. Mallory Heyer. junior from Chaska, had 18 points and 16 rebounds, and Amaya Battle, junior from Hopkins, 17 points and five assists.

In the semifinals, the Gophers beat Florida 66-52,

with two former Hopkins teammates on opposite sides. McKinney had 14 points for the Gophers and freshman Liv McGill scored 18 for Florida. Grace Gro-

Coached by Dawn Plitzuweit, the Gophers were 8-10 in the Big Ten regular season and lost to Washington in the first round of the conference tournament.

Top three scorers were Grocholski, averaging points, Battle 12.8 and McKinney 10.6. Behind them were Sophie Hart (senior from Farmington) with 8.9, Heyer 8.6, Annika Stewart (senior from Wayzata) 8.5, and Taylor Woodson (sophomore from Hopkins) 8.1.

Mara Braun, junior from Wayzata, was averaging 13.5 points after five games when she had a season-ending foot injury. She missed 14 games last year with the same injury. She averaged 16 points in 56 career games.

Who are THE BEST coaches?

This summer will mark my 50th year working in summer camps. My first camp was in Pierre, SD, in May of 1976. The water in the Missouri River was COLD - but we swam anyway. Yeah!

There were 37 players in the camp. They each paid \$30 for a 15-hour camp. Let's see...\$2/hour in 1976 is worth what in 2025? \$11.12/hour

We would be charging \$170 today for a 15-hour camp. That comes to...let's see...\$11.33/hour. Almost exactly the same!

I loved working in the camp immediately. Spending time with kids who want to learn is really enjoyable. In a camp, in a gym, you can have fun! Kids are active, learning, happy to be there.

I've had several different basketball coaches myself as a player - a former NBA player, an All-Big Ten player, a Big Ten champion coach who was later an NBA coach. My baseball coach, my football coach, my golf coach...all different in their own way as basketball coaches.

The No. 1 thing that makes THE BEST coaches... in my opinion...is that they care about your learning and improvement...and, as a bonus, they care about you as a person.

Players who have played at a high level have an advantage in that they've experienced most everything they are teaching - but not all understand it well enough to teach it. Good coaches who haven't played basketball or didn't play much can still understand it and teach it well. They see it. So it is really an individual thing.

For our Pacesetter Camps, we look for coaches with a successful background who love to teach and care about kids.

I love Minnesota!

I remember being in a general store somewhere in northern Minnesota, when a customer mentioned - surprise, surprise - something about the "bad weather". An 10-player All-Star team will be selcted along with a Most Valuable Player award for both boys and girls.



Brian "Cos" Cosgriff Retires

One retiring coach who is making headlines is Brian Cosgriff, who won seven state championships at Hopkins before retiring the first time. Then he returned as head coach of Minnetonka and won the 2024 state championship for his 8th state title. Dave Shama has written a piece on Brian in his weekly column of Minnesota sports at www.shamasportsheadliners.com.

With Dave's permission, an edited version of the column is printed below:

In breaking news this afternoon Minnesota high school girl's basketball coaching legend Brian Cosgriff told Sports Headliners he is leaving the profession.

Cosgriff plans to meet with his Minnetonka team tomorrow morning to inform them of his decision to retire. He coached the Skippers to the State Class 4A championship last season and Minnetonka is expected to have a standout team in 2025-2026.

Cosgriff leaves coaching having won over 600 games (631-93 record) and eight girls state titles. The first seven came at Hopkins. He won the

league title 19 of 20 seasons at Hopkins.

Last season Cosgriff's energy was challenged by an 80-plus hours work week split between coaching the Skippers and his physical education assignment at DeLaSalle High School. Looking ahead, Cosgriff knew he faced a difficult situation with his energy and passion to coach.

"There were times this year I was just really tired. It just kind of hit me this year."

Cosgriff, a beloved coach by so many players and others, turned 64 last month. He said his health is fine, but he wants to be proactive and protective of it.

"The key to this life is you gotta be healthy and happy."

Cosgriff has been thinking about his decision to step away from the stress of coaching for a while. "I am at peace with it. I really am."

The input of coaching friends helped with his decision. They told him, "You just know when it's time to get out."

"I am very sad about it from the standpoint of I won't be working with my brother (Barry), who I have had hand-in-hand with me for 24 years," Cosgriff said. "He's the best in the business. I am hoping whoever gets the new job wants to keep him on because he's very much a part of the Minnetonka community. ..."

Cosgriff will continue at DeLaSalle but has no plans to coach anywhere else in the future, happy to leave the demands of the profession behind. He plans to work on the football chain crews at DeLaSalle and the University of Minnesota and has other part-time ideas in mind to remain involved with sports and the community.

"I don't ever envision coaching again," he said.

A Golden Valley native, Cosgriff lives two blocks from the house he grew up in. "I went away to college (Macalester), though. I went to St. Paul," he teased.

Kevin Anderson, Girls' Basketball afficianodo, retires

Kevin Anderson, who has provided the rankings for girls' basketball teams and players over the past 30+ years for Minnesota Basketball News and kept a daily blog on girls' basketball, has decided to retire. He has also been on the Miss Basketball committee since 2004. He prepared a series of booklets previewing the basketball seasons 1996-2008. He started blogging and covering games online in 2005. He was recognized by the Minnesota Coaches' Association Hall of Fame in 2012.

Kevin started as head boys' coach at Ellsworth, made the leap to girls' head coach at Minneapolis South, and has been both head coach and assistant at a number of schools during a tenure that has included coaching stints at Osseo, Bethel, Mahtomedi and Stillwater.



His passion for girls' basketball and his contributions have been immense behind the scenes as he has slipped into gym and after gym with his customized chair and notebooks and cap and glasses down his nose as he uses a unique system of hieroglyphics that he scrawls constatntly, analyzing the effectiveness of each player and team. His analytics recognized Paige Bueckers at an early age as a future great. "I was at Ames, IA, when Paige Bueckers first met Caitlin Clark."

Kevin once traveled to Roseau on Monday, Winona on Tuesday, a Metro game on Wednesday, East Grand Forks on Thursday, and Pine Island on Friday. "I don't recall my destination that Saturday, but my mileage from that week equaled the distance from Key West, Florida to Maine."

He has seen many great games. "There was one stretch of three games in a row where the team behind hit the winning shot at the buzzer: Buffalo Lake-Hector on Thursday, Benilde-St. Margaret's on Friday, and Buffalo on Saturday."

He has also seen "countless amazing players. I saw Lindsay Whalen's first high school game, and still have the program, vs. Glencoe-Silver Lake."

He will still watch games, but "now my radius has narrowed. I will be more local-based (sorry, Roseau) and not every night or day. Thanks for all the memories, Minnesota...and the region."

Thank YOU, Kevin, for adding insight, excitement, analysis, opportunities, coaching, and generally uplifting and enhancing girls' basketball in Minnesota and the Midwest, making it an even more special place to play. Your contributions will long be appreciated.
