5,000 Point Club doubles

Oehrlein sets record, Greenway close behind

The 5,000-Point Club, the most exclusive fraternity in Minnesota prep sports, has doubled in size, from two to four. And one previous member showed up to congratulate a new one who broke her record.

Two senior superstars who've joined the club are Tori Oehrlein of Crosby-Ironton with a 50-point binge against Ogilvie on Jan. 16, and Maddyn Greenway of Providence Academy while scoring 37 against Blake on Jan. 30.

The previous members were Anders Broman of Lakeville Christian in Duluth with 5,119 points, graduating in 2014, and Rebekah Dahlman of Braham with 5,060 points, graduating in 2013.

Oehrlein, who'll be a Gopher next year, has passed both to become the state record holder for both genders. The 5-foot-11 guard beat Dahlman's girls record

while pouring in 57 points against Mille Lacs on Jan. 20, and eclipsed Broman's total while scoring 38 against Pine City on Jan. 29.

Dahlman was in attendance Jan. 20 and graciously presented Oehrlein with flowers and a Minnesota-shaped plaque.

Oehrlein was touched. "I didn't know she was coming until two hours before the game," she told reporters, "and it meant a lot to me knowing that she was supporting me. She was just so sweet."

Dahlman, who played for Vanderbilt, is back living in Minnesota after a few years working in Atlanta. Broman continued his career at Winthrop University, South Carolina.

Oehrlein reached 5,000 in 164 games, Greenway in 170 games. Dahlman played in 186 games and Broman 161 games.

Greenway, a Kentucky recruit, and Oehrlein faced each other in the state finals last season, with Greenway's team winning to capture their fourth straight title. They might have a 2026 rematch at state as the Lions and Rangers have been ranked first and second all year. If they meet in the finals, a sub-plot would be the career totals for each.

The two 5,000-pointers are the top two scorers in the state, not surprisingly. Oehrlein is averaging 36.6 points. Greenway, a fleet 5-foot-8 guard, also a track and soccer all-stater, is averaging 33.9.

Titans take another run at it

Tartan, a year ago, was the best team not in the state tournament, a distinction the Titans are aiming to lose this March. The run and gun Titans are 44-1 the last two seasons, their only setback coming in the Section 4 finals to their main nemesis, Cretin-Derham Hall.

Tartan is 17-0 and ranked No. 2 behind defending state champion Wayzata. Their signature wins are 84-76 over No. 9 Hopkins and 68-61 over No. 5 Maple Grove, both in December. In the Metro East Conference, they've beaten Class 3A's No. 5 ranked Mahtomedi 85-69 and 78-56. Their closest game has been 72-67 over St. Thomas Academy (9-9).

This year's edition is "really solid again" while trying to cut down on mistakes, said 37th-year coach Mark Klingsporn. "We are a work in progress. Last year's team developed a special quality of togetherness and unselfishness. We do some team-bonding things, like going to Las Vegas this year for scrimmages."

Tartan was 27-1 last season, losing to Cretin-Derham Hall, the eventual state runner-up, 73-68, and went 24-5 the year before, ousted by CDH 59-49 — each time on the Raiders home court, which rankles the coach.

"There is no way a section final should be held at the highest seed," he said. "And that is the opinion of almost all coaches." Then again, the Titans might earn the same advantage for themselves this season.

Their top scorer last year, CJ Banks, who averaged 20 points, graduated, and now plays for Dakota Wesleyan.

Leading the Titans is Kevin Wilson Jr., slim 6-foot-1 sophomore prodigy in his fourth varsity season, averaging 22 points and running the offense on a team that's mostly seniors. He averaged 17 points as a freshman, nine points as an eighth-grader and six points as a seventh grader.

"(Wilson) has some great qualities. Very skilled. Coachable," Klingsporn said. "Loyal to his teammates, school, community. But his greatest quality is that he

is fearless. There is not a situation he has not stepped up to."

Also scoring steadily are Duke King, a 6-foot-5 senior; Emmanuel Oyesanmi, 6-foot-4 sophomore; Jaylen Gergen, 6-foot-2 senior; Tyrel Pride, 6-foot-1 senior; and Laquan Stewart, 6-foot-1 senior. King averages close to 15 points.

"Duke grew up in our traveling program and just needed an opportunity to be pushed to improve certain aspects of his game," the coach said. "He is an excellent rebounder, defender and has a big motor."

It's modest-sized team of mostly guards with dizzying quickness, most of their points coming on slashes to the hoop, in both transition and half-court offense, augmented by numerous three-pointers as well. They are averaging 81.3 points.

"We have some athletic kids that guard hard and play hard," Klingsporn said. "They are great kids. That's why I'm still coaching."

Klingsporn's career record is 721-284 with nine state trips and one championship (in 2000). He's closing in on his 23rd straight 20-win season. Their last state trip was 2014.

Finally winning again, Edgerton elated

Edgerton in 1959-60 had one of the most memorable seasons in Minnesota history. This tiny school in the southwest corner of the state came out of nowhere and knocked off several big schools to claim the state championship in the old single class format. They were the toast of the state, and years later inducted as a team into the MN Basketball Hall of Fame.

That was then and this is now. Edgerton entered 2025-26 with just one winning season in the last 25 (13-7 in 2015-16) including 12 seasons of 0-3 wins, a combined 7-166 from 2015-23, and back-to-back winless seasons.

Edgerton Public is finally winning again. It's hardly a top-ten calibre team but the Dutchmen were 11-5 through January and had one seven-game win streak.

"The kids and community are excited to have Dutchmen basketball competitive again, and I think it gives the kids great pride," coach Michael Dwire said.

The Dutchmen were 11-16 last year with two playoff wins that "helped set us up for this year," Dwire said. "We returned a handful of key players, and those, along with some players new to the varsity, were looking to build on that late-season success."

Dawson-Boyd can be proud of NBA rookie

Kon Kneuppel, the NBA rookie who was part of a historic scoring binge recently, has family roots in Dawson-Boyd. Kneuppel hit 34 points for Charlotte while his former Duke teammate Cooper Flagg sank 49 points for Dallas in their first NBA game against each other, setting a record for points by two rookies.

Kneuppel, who is averaging 19 points, won it for the Hornets 123-121 on two free shots with :04 left.

Kneuppel's mom is the former Chari Nordgaard, who scored 1,580 points for Dawson-Boyd (and led their best season, section runners-up) before starring at Wisconsin-Green Bay, where her 22.5 points per game as a senior in 1998-99 remains the team record. Chari coached briefly after college before getting married and raising her own basketball team. She and husband Kon Sr. have five sons, Kon Jr. being the oldest.

Kade Moffit, senior guard, four-year starter, averages 24.6 points and recently passed the 1,500 marker. Colin Scholten, junior guard, averages 14.6 points. Those two and senior Michael Guinnick give Edgerton a trio of experienced guards to lead the team.

"We've had some wins over programs that we have not beaten in the regular season in a while," he noted, "such as Murray County Central, RTR, and Pipestone Area, which have been highlights for us."

Edgerton has a K-12 enrollment of about 430 and 9-12 enrollment of about 110, all housed in one building. One of the smallest schools that's still going it alone, Edgerton has only two winter sports, boys and girls basketball. The girls team is 7-15. The 1960's gym was finally demolished last summer.

Edgerton is poor cousins to the town's parochial school, Southwest Minnesota Christian, which logged five state championships, most recently 2013, plus a 29-0 season when the 2020 state tourney was cancelled. SWC is currently 15-2 and beat the Dutchmen by 35 in December.

Kneuppel's uncle is Jeff Nordgaard, who led the Blackjacks to a third-place finish at state in a two-class tournament in 1991 and scored 1,653 career points, then had a great career at Wisconsin-Green Bay, where his 1,911 points ranks fourth all-time. He had a brief stay with the Milwaukee Bucks, then several pro seasons in Europe.

The Kneuppels live in Milwaukee. Kon Jr. played for Wisconsin Lutheran in Milwaukee.

Around the state: girls

Central Minnesota Christian nudged Sleepy Eye-St. Mary's from the unbeaten ranks 74-70 on Jan. 31 at Southwest State, with Sienna Duinck delivering 31 points, seven rebounds and six steals. Emmi Braem added 16 points and Carrie Mulder 13. The Bluejays (15-2) took a 72-70 lead on a banked-in three-pointer and added two free shots. "Overall, two good teams going at it," reflected SESM coach Bruce Woitas. Morgan Mathiowetz sank 26 points for SESM and Olivia Schieffert 21 points, including her 1,000th.

Wayzata toppled No. 1 Hopkins 61-52 on Jan. 23 and took over the top slot in the rankings. Maren Day hit 17 points, Mallory McBeth 16, and Kate Amelotte and Sawyer Backer 10 each. For Hopkins, Ava Cupito sank 14 points and Erma Walker 12. Hopkins tripped Class 3A's No. 1 Orono 64-53 on Jan. 31 with Jaliyah Diggs scoring 21 points and Walker and Ava Smith 15 each. Amelia Schwendimann sank 21 for Orono.

Perham (17-2) was 19-for-38 on three-pointers in a 90-27 win at Park Rapids on Jan. 30, led by Regan Helmsberger, Quinn Hanson, Kaia Anderson and Sydney Pettow, breaking the school record by one. That was the sixth game of a stretch when Perham went 78-for-172, a 46 percent clip, coach TJ Super reports.

Marshall beat Hill-Murray 100-85 in top-five duel Jan. 24. Reese Drake exploded for 40 points, shooting 12-for-19 (three 3-pointers) and 13-for-14 on free shots. The Tigers were 32-for-39 at the line. Hill-Murray's six-foot Wilson sisters, both Division I recruits, combined for 69 points as Mya, a junior, scored 36 and Ashlee, eighth-grader, scored 33 with seven three's.

Kelliher/Northome, No. 2 in Class 1A, has Kate Thayer with over 3,000 points, Kylee Binkley over 2,000, and Allison Lundin over 1,000, all seniors. Thayer recently became the first player in the state to reach 1,000 steals.

Sacred Heart of East Grand Forks has four juniors with over 1,000 points. Lexi Lawrence and Lydia Risky got there last season as sophomores and Finley Horken and Leah Sundby joined them in late January.

Prior Lake, a below-.500 team, handed Rosemount its first loss 80-71 on Jan. 20, led by Fiona Anttila with 26 points. Toni Fisher had 15 and Ava Bryntson 12. Ashna Ramlall netted 25 and Anisha Ramlall 18 for Rosemount. Prior Lake (9-11) then beat another ranked team, Eastview, 75-62 as Fisher sank 27 points.

Around the state: boys

Wayzata, ranked No. 1, pulled out a 97-96 overtime win over No. 3 Buffalo on Jan. 30 in Buffalo, powered by Christian Wiggins with a school record 45 points, along with 16 rebounds. Their other senior star Nolen Anderson added 28 points. Buffalo sophomore Eli Hegle sank 30 points and junior Matthew Jordan 24 points. The Bison made it close by drilling 17 three-pointers.

Hopkins is a relatively modest 12-6 (by their standards) but gave Wayzata a scare on Jan. 23, losing to the Trojans 80-76, and toppled No. 3 Maple Grove 79-63 on Jan. 30. Against Wayzata, Hopkins had five double-digit scorers led by Jayden Moore with 19 points and nine assists and Tre Moore with 15 points. Against Maple Grove, Moore had 24 points and nine assists, Ahmed Nur 23 points and Xavier Phillips 15.

Southwest Christian tripped then No. 1 in Class 2A Belle Plaine 81-62 on Jan. 19 led by Jack Burke with 29 points. Ethan Martin had 25 for Belle Plaine.

Morris Area/Chokio-Alberta is the lone unbeaten boys team in Class 2A with a 15-0 mark. The Tigers, ranked No. 2, handed No. 5 Montevideo its lone loss 68-66 on Dec. 11, with Alex Asmus hitting a tie-breaking three-pointer with eight seconds left. Otherwise they have won every game by at least 10 points.

Three unbeaten teams are ranked 1-2-3 in Class 1A — Henning, Red Lake County, and Janesville-Waldorf-Pemberton —and another, Menahga, just now made the rankings at No. 10.

Deron Russell, an all-state tourney player for Waseca last year, is averaging 33.4 points, including a school record 48 in the season opener against Belle Plaine, an 88-84 loss. The senior guard has had games of 46, 44, 43 and 41 game for the Bluejays (12-7). Russell sank 83 points in the state tournament, leading Waseca to a runner-up finish.

Catholic powers DeLaSalle and Cretin-Derham Hall entertained a loud capacity crowd at DeLaSalle on Saturday with the hosts pulling out an 82-81 win in overtime. Kamar Thomas delivered the game-winning shot and totaled 16 points. Jaeden Udean tallied 19 points, Evan Miller 14 and Ichima Idoko 13. CDH guard JoJo Mitchell poured in 36 points and Ty Schlagel netted 19.
